Definitions of "Parameters" as a noun

- *(computer science) a reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program.*
- *A quantity (such as the mean or variance) that characterizes a statistical population and that can be estimated by calculations from sample data.*
- *A reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program.*
- *Any factor that defines a system and determines (or limits) its performance.*
- *A constant in the equation of a curve that can be varied to yield a family of similar curves.*

boundary	A limit of something abstract, especially a subject or sphere of activity. <i>The river marks the boundary between the two regions.</i>
circumscribe	Draw (a figure) round another, touching it at points but not cutting it. <i>Our actions are circumscribed by our biology personality and by the social and cultural context into which we are born.</i>
confine	Restrict or confine. <i>Within the confines of the hall escape was difficult.</i>
curb	Restrain a horse by means of a curb. <i>She promised she would curb her temper.</i>
degree	A unit of temperature on a specified scale. <i>Second degree relatives.</i>
delimit	Determine the limits or boundaries of. <i>Agreements delimiting fishing zones.</i>
demarcate	Set, mark, or draw the boundaries of something. <i>Art was being demarcated from the more objective science.</i>
detain	Cause to be slowed down or delayed. <i>Customs officers may detain goods for up to two days.</i>
dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
edge	Provide with an edge. <i>A flamenco singer brings a primitive edge to the music.</i>
extent	The distance or area or volume over which something extends. <i>An orchard of considerable extent.</i>
finite	Of verbs; relating to forms of the verb that are limited in time by a tense and (usually) show agreement with number and person. <i>Every computer has a finite amount of memory.</i>
grade	Arrange in or allocate to grades classify or sort. <i>She teaches first grade.</i>
insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
limit	Final or latest limiting point. <i>The failure showed the limits of British power.</i>

normalcy	Expectedness as a consequence of being usual or regular or common.
overestimate	An excessively high estimate. <i>The figure of 30 per cent was an overestimate.</i>
overrate	Make too high an estimate of. <i>His father greatly overrated his abilities.</i>
periphery	The outer limits or edge of an area or object. <i>New buildings on the periphery of the hospital site.</i>
precinct	The police station situated in a precinct. <i>At the precinct a desk sergeant ran through her ID.</i>
range	Have a range be capable of projecting over a certain distance as of a gun. <i>No one would know if he had survived to live out his life in the ranges back from the river country.</i>
restrain	Place limits on (extent or access). <i>The need to restrain public expenditure.</i>
restrict	Place under restrictions limit access to by law. <i>The Zoological Gardens were at first restricted to members and their guests.</i>
scope	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Such questions go beyond the scope of this book.</i>
scrimp	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>I have scrumped and saved to give you a good education.</i>
stint	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>He doesn't stint on wining and dining.</i>
stratum	A thin layer within any structure. <i>A stratum of flint.</i>
varying	Differing in size, amount, degree, or nature. <i>The varying angles of roof slope.</i>
widely	Far apart; with a wide space or interval between. <i>She was widely read.</i>
