<b><a href="#">concubine</a></b>	A woman who cohabits with an important man.
<b><a href="#">courtesan</a></b>	A woman who cohabits with an important man. <i>They diverted their remaining funds into frequenting <b>courtesans</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">doxy</a></b>	A prostitute.
<b><a href="#">fancy man</a></b>	A kind of imagination that was held by Coleridge to be more casual and superficial than true imagination.
<b><a href="#">lover</a></b>	A person who likes or enjoys a specified thing. <i>I think she had a secret <b>lover</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Paramour" (30 Words)

<b>alimony</b>	Financial support that a person is ordered by a court to give to their spouse during separation or following divorce; maintenance. <i>He is said to have paid 300 000 <b>alimony</b> to his first wife.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A rich, fashionable young man; a dandy.
<b>bigamy</b>	The offense of marrying someone while you have a living spouse from whom no valid divorce has occurred.
<b><u>boyfriend</u></b>	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman. <i>If I d known he was her <b>boyfriend</b> I wouldn t have asked.</i>
<b><u>concubine</u></b>	A woman who cohabits with an important man.
<b>connubial</b>	Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband. <i>Their <b>connubial</b> bed.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	Connect (a railway vehicle or a piece of equipment) to another. <i>Clean the stains with a <b>couple</b> squirts dishwashing liquid.</i>
<b><u>darling</u></b>	Used as an affectionate form of address to a beloved person. <i>Good night <b>darling</b>.</i>
<b><u>estranged</u></b>	(of a person) no longer close or affectionate to someone; alienated. <i>Harriet felt more <b>estranged</b> from her daughter than ever.</i>
<b>ex</b>	A man who was formerly a certain woman's husband. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>He was an extremely obliging <b>fellow</b>.</i>
<b>fiance</b>	A man who is engaged to be married.
<b>fiancee</b>	A woman who is engaged to be married.
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>The foreign ministers extended to eastern Europe the hand of <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b><u>girlfriend</u></b>	A girl or young woman with whom a man is romantically involved. <i>His <b>girlfriend</b> kicked him out.</i>
<b><u>husband</u></b>	A married man considered in relation to his spouse. <i>She and her <b>husband</b> are both retired.</i>
<b><u>lover</u></b>	A partner in a sexual or romantic relationship outside marriage. <i>I think she had a secret <b>lover</b>.</i>
<b>married</b>	A person who is married. <i>A happily <b>married</b> man.</i>

<b>marry</b>	Blend or combine with something. <i>Most Chardonnays don't <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>
<b>matrimony</b>	The state of being married; marriage. <i>The joys of <b>matrimony</b>.</i>
<b>mistress</b>	A woman master who directs the work of others. <i>A <b>mistress</b> of the sound bite she is famed for the acidity of her tongue.</i>
<b>moll</b>	The girlfriend of a gangster. <i>I'd rush the money over to his <b>moll</b>.</i>
<b>morganatic</b>	Of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a <b>morganatic</b> marriage with a German born actress.</i>
<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<b>partner</b>	Act as a partner. <i>We've <b>partnered</b> with several venues and organizations to bring fun science events to the city.</i>
<b>polygamy</b>	The condition or practice of having more than one spouse at a time.
<b>spouse</b>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>wed</b>	Get married to. <i>He was to <b>wed</b> the king's daughter.</i>
<b>widower</b>	A man whose wife is dead especially one who has not remarried. <i>Her new found passion has turned me into a tennis <b>widower</b>.</i>
<b>wife</b>	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>A clergy <b>wife</b>.</i>
