<b>group</b>	Two or more figures or objects forming a design. <i>I ve always been a fan of the guitarists in the <b>group</b>.</i>
<b>horde</b>	A large group of people. <i>Tartar <b>hordes</b>.</i>
<b>mob</b>	A flock or herd of animals. <i>He stood out from the rest of the <b>mob</b> with his silver hair and stacked shoes.</i>
<b>pack</b>	A quantity of fish fruit or other foods packed or canned in a particular season. <i>The reports were a <b>pack</b> of lies.</i>
<b>package</b>	A package holiday. <i>A <b>package</b> of measures announced by the government.</i>
<b>packet</b>	The contents of a packet. <i>I can eat a whole <b>packet</b> of biscuits in one go.</i>
<b>parcel of land</b>	A wrapped container.
<b>party</b>	A person, especially one with specified characteristics. <i>In 1992 Perot tried to organize a third <b>party</b> at the national level.</i>
<b>patch</b>	An adhesive piece of drug-impregnated material worn on the skin so that the drug may be absorbed gradually over a period of time. <i><b>Patches</b> of bluebells in the grass.</i>
<b>piece</b>	A sandwich or other item of food taken as a snack. <i>I need to rest for a <b>piece</b>.</i>
<b>piece of ground</b>	A share of something.
<b>piece of land</b>	A work of art of some artistic value.
<b>plot</b>	A diagram, chart, or map. <i>The <b>plot</b> consists almost entirely of a man and woman falling in love.</i>
<b>portion</b>	A person's destiny or lot. <i>He ll marry her fast enough when he knows the sum of her <b>portion</b>.</i>
<b>section</b>	A particular district of a town. <i>Nails of round <b>section</b>.</i>

<b>share</b>	An instance of posting or reposting something on a social media website or application. <i>He wanted his <b>share</b> in cash.</i>
<b>tract</b>	A brief treatise on a subject of interest; published in the form of a booklet. <i>Large <b>tracts</b> of natural forest.</i>
<b>troop</b>	An orderly crowd. <i><b>Troop</b> cuts.</i>

- *Make (something) into a parcel by wrapping it.*
- *Make into a wrapped container.*
- *Divide into portions and then distribute.*
- *Cover with strips of canvas.*
- *Divide into parts.*

<b>allocate</b>	Distribute (resources or duties) for a particular purpose. <i>In past years we didn't <b>allocate</b> enough funds to infrastructure maintenance.</i>
<b>allot</b>	Allow to have. <i>I was <b>allotted</b> a little room in the servants block.</i>
<b><u>apportion</u></b>	Give out as one's portion or share. <i>Voting power will be <b>apportioned</b> according to contribution.</i>
<b>box</b>	Engage in a boxing match. <i>I'll <b>box</b> your ears.</i>

<b>fasten together</b>	Cause to be firmly attached.
<b>gift-wrap</b>	Wrap (a gift) attractively.
<b>give out</b>	Inflict as a punishment.
<b>hand out</b>	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Seal with packing. <i>Students recently <b>packed</b> a hall to hear the poet.</i>
<b>pack up</b>	Fill to capacity.
<b><u>package</u></b>	Combine (various products) for sale as one unit. <i>It's a question of trying to <b>package</b> the book properly.</i>
<b>portion out</b>	Give out.
<b>share out</b>	Have in common.
<b>split up</b>	Come open suddenly and violently, as if from internal pressure.
<b>tie up</b>	Unite musical notes by a tie.
<b><u>wrap</u></b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The candles are <b>wrapped</b> in tissue paper.</i>
<b>wrap up</b>	Crash into so as to coil around.

<b>consignment</b>	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>A <b>consignment</b> of drugs.</i>
<b>ferryman</b>	A man who operates a ferry.
<b>freight</b>	A charge for transport by freight. <i>A decline in the amount of <b>freight</b> carried by rail.</i>
<b>lade</b>	Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>Vessels <b>lade</b> there.</i>
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>If the wire in the fuse is too thin to accept the <b>load</b> it will melt.</i>
<b>overload</b>	Become overloaded. <i>The wiring had been <b>overloaded</b>.</i>
<b>pack</b>	A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>A <b>pack</b> of cigarettes.</i>
<b>package</b>	A package holiday. <i>Someone had left a suspicious <b>package</b>.</i>
<b>packet</b>	Make up into or wrap up in a packet. <i>A hectic social life could cost a <b>packet</b>.</i>
<b>packing</b>	The action or process of packing something. <i>A rifle <b>packing</b> sheriff.</i>

<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>She <b>piled</b> all the groceries on the counter.</i>
<b>post</b>	Publicize with or as if with a poster. <i>She <b>posted</b> a photo of herself with the singer on Twitter.</i>
<b>ream</b>	Enlarge with a reamer. <i><b>Ream</b> a hole.</i>
<b>sheaf</b>	A package of several things tied together for carrying or storing. <i>He waved a <b>sheaf</b> of papers in the air.</i>
<b>shipment</b>	The action of shipping goods. <i>Logs waiting for <b>shipment</b>.</i>
<b>shipping</b>	The transport of goods by sea or some other means. <i>The volume of <b>shipping</b> using these ports.</i>
<a href="#"><u>stack</u></a>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i><b>Stack</b> the deck of cards.</i>
<b>stuff</b>	Fill with a stuffing while cooking. <i>Her dark <b>stuff</b> gown.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>He scored 102 not out his third <b>ton</b> of the tour.</i>
<b>transportation</b>	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of <b>transportation</b> for life.</i>
