Parse as a Verb

Definitions of "Parse" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “parse” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Analyze syntactically by assigning a constituent structure to (a sentence).*
- *Resolve (a sentence) into its component parts and describe their syntactic roles.*
- *Analyse (a string or text) into logical syntactic components.*



Synonyms of "Parse" as a verb (12 Words)

analyse	Psychoanalyse someone. <i>We need to analyse our results more clearly.</i>
decode	Convert (a coded message) into intelligible language. <i>Processors used to decode CD quality digital audio signals.</i>
elucidate	Make free from confusion or ambiguity; make clear. <i>In what follows I shall try to elucidate what I believe the problems to be.</i>
explain	Be the cause of or motivating factor for. <i>They explained that their lives centred on the religious rituals.</i>
gloss	Give a shine or gloss to usually by rubbing. <i>The singer glossed her lips a deep red.</i>
interpret	Give an interpretation or explanation to. <i>I agreed to interpret for Jean Claude.</i>
read	Habitually read a particular newspaper or periodical. <i>For madam read madman.</i>
render	Give up surrender. <i>They had to render the estate.</i>
see	Go to see a place as for entertainment. <i>Elements are usually classified as metals or non metals see chapter 11.</i>
take	Take on a certain form attribute or aspect. <i>Some people found her hard to take.</i>
take to mean	Take by force.
understand	Be understanding of. <i>I understand how you feel.</i>

Usage Examples of "Parse" as a verb

- *I asked a couple of students to parse these sentences for me.*
- *A user question input is parsed into an internal conceptual representation.*

Associations of "Parse" (30 Words)

alliterate	(of a phrase or line of verse) contain words which begin with the same sound or letter. <i>His first and last names alliterated.</i>
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alphabet	A character set that includes letters and is used to write a language. <i>A phonetic alphabet.</i>
analyze	Break down into components or essential features. <i>Analyze a sentence.</i>
antonym	A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word in which case the two words are antonyms of each other. <i>To him the antonym of gay was depressed.</i>
apostrophe	The mark (') used to indicate the omission of one or more letters from a printed word.
bewitchment	A magical spell.
collocation	A pair or group of words that are habitually juxtaposed. <i>The words have a similar range of collocation.</i>
correction	Punishment, especially that of criminals in prison intended to rectify their behaviour. <i>The incompatibility of justice and correction as penal objectives has long been the major unsolved problem of penal practice.</i>
grammar	A book on grammar. <i>Chomskyan grammar.</i>
grammarian	A linguist who specializes in the study of grammar and syntax.
homonym	Two words are homonyms if they are pronounced or spelled the same way but have different meanings.
<u>indent</u>	A space left by indenting text. <i>We were indenting for paper clips one by one in those days.</i>
indentation	A deep recess or notch on the edge or surface of something. <i>Coastal indentations.</i>
<u>juxtaposition</u>	A side-by-side position. <i>The juxtaposition of these two images.</i>
litotes	Understatement for rhetorical effect (especially when expressing an affirmative by negating its contrary). <i>Saying I was not a little upset when you mean I was very upset is an example of litotes.</i>
<u>morphology</u>	A particular form, shape, or structure. <i>Grammar is organized along two main dimensions morphology and syntax.</i>
orthography	The study of spelling and how letters combine to represent sounds and form words. <i>A spoken language which has as yet no sanctioned orthography.</i>

paragraph	Divide into paragraphs as of text. <i>All her friends were paragraphed in last Monday s paper.</i>
phrase	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>They phrased the music with gusto.</i>
punctuation	The marks, such as full stop, comma, and brackets, used in writing to separate sentences and their elements and to clarify meaning. <i>Satisfactory standards of handwriting spelling grammar and punctuation.</i>
quotation	A registration granted to a company enabling their shares to be officially listed and traded. <i>A quotation from Mark Twain.</i>
<u>rhetoric</u>	Language designed to have a persuasive or impressive effect, but which is often regarded as lacking in sincerity or meaningful content. <i>Mere rhetoric.</i>
sentence	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>He always spoke in grammatical sentences.</i>
<u>spelling</u>	The way a word is spelled. <i>Her spelling was deplorable.</i>
<u>syntax</u>	The branch of linguistics that deals with syntax. <i>Generative syntax.</i>
typo	A typographical error.
typographic	Relating to or occurring or used in typography. <i>The typographic art.</i>
ungrammatical	Not conforming to grammatical rules. <i>Ungrammatical sentences.</i>
vocabulary	The words used in a particular subject or sphere of activity or on a particular occasion. <i>The term became part of business vocabulary.</i>
word	The divine word of God the second person in the Trinity incarnate in Jesus. <i>He hardly said ten words all morning.</i>
