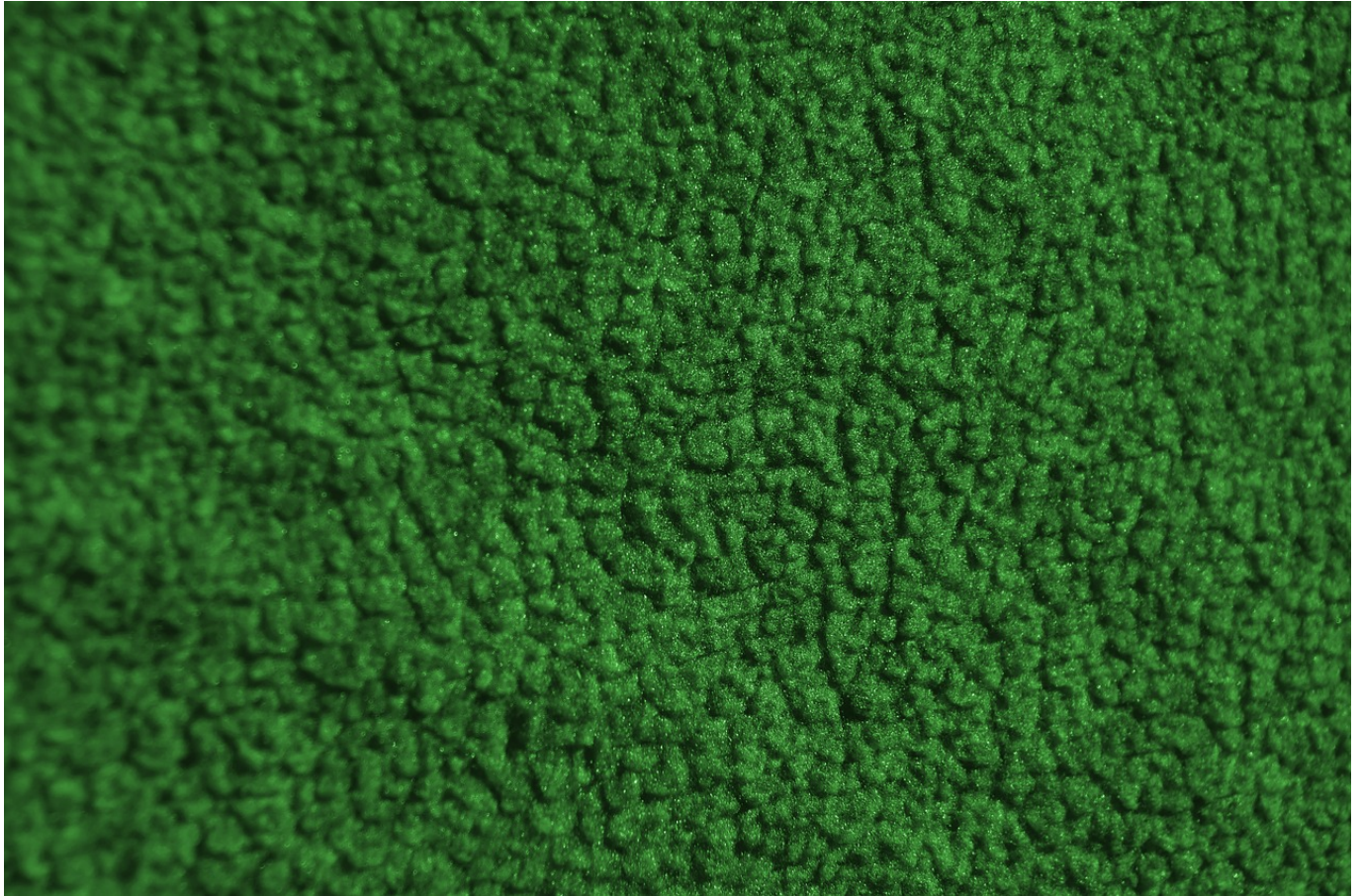

## Partial as a Noun

### Definitions of "Partial" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “partial” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A component of a musical sound; an overtone or harmonic.*
- *The derivative of a function of two or more variables with respect to a single variable while the other variables are considered to be constant.*
- *A harmonic with a frequency that is a multiple of the fundamental frequency.*



### Synonyms of "Partial" as a noun (3 Words)

<b>overtone</b>	A subtle or subsidiary quality, implication, or connotation. <i>The decision may have political <b>overtones</b>.</i>
<b>partial derivative</b>	A harmonic with a frequency that is a multiple of the fundamental frequency.
<b>partial tone</b>	A harmonic with a frequency that is a multiple of the fundamental frequency.

- *Strings would like to oscillate as closely as possible to harmonic partials.*



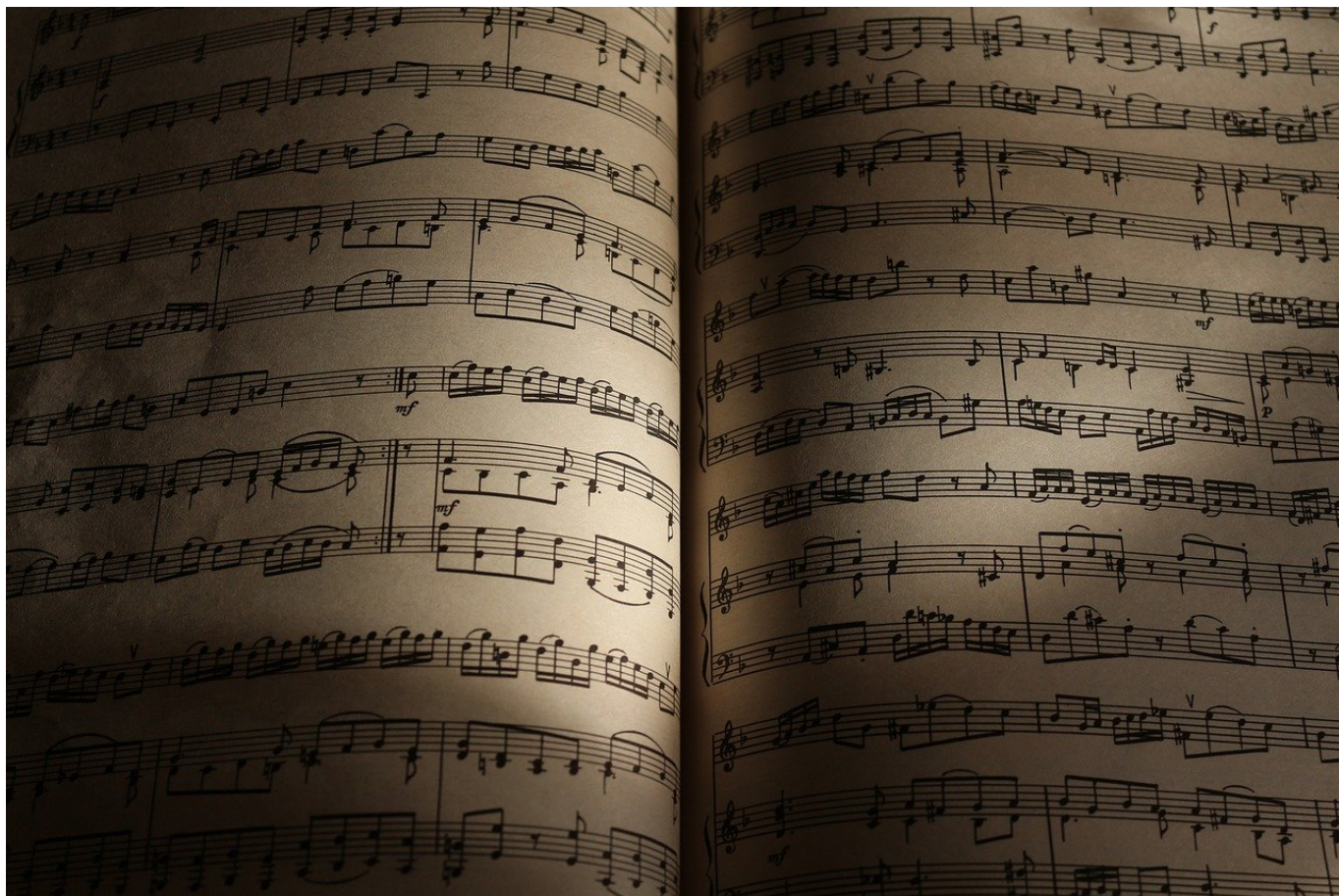


## Partial as an Adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "partial" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Being or affecting only a part; not total.*
- *(followed by `of' or `to') having a strong preference or liking for.*
- *Showing favoritism.*
- *Having a liking for.*
- *Existing only in part; incomplete.*
- *Having a strong preference or liking for.*
- *Favouring one side in a dispute above the other; biased.*



## Synonyms of "Partial" as an adjective (20 Words)

- biased** Favoring one person or side over another.  
*We will not tolerate this **biased** media coverage.*
- coloured** Having skin rich in melanin pigments.  
*There was a drive to recruit **coloured** black and Indian members.*
- discriminatory** Manifesting partiality.  
*A **discriminatory** tax.*
- fond** Affectionate; loving.  
*He was not too **fond** of dancing.*
- fragmentary** Consisting of small disconnected or incomplete parts.  
*Excavations have revealed **fragmentary** remains of masonry.*
- imperfect** (of a tense) denoting a past action in progress but not completed at the time in question.  
***Imperfect** mortals.*



<b><u>incomplete</u></b>	Not yet finished. <i><b>Incomplete</b> carvings of cattle.</i>
<b>interested</b>	Having an interest or involvement; not impartial. <i>Seeking views from all <b>interested</b> parties.</i>
<b>jaundiced</b>	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. <i>They looked on politicians with a <b>jaundiced</b> eye.</i>
<b>like</b>	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>Members of the cat family have <b>like</b> dispositions.</i>
<b>limited</b>	Denoting a limited company used after a company name. <i>A <b>limited</b> list of choices.</i>
<b>one-sided</b>	Favoring one person or side over another.
<b>partisan</b>	Devoted to a cause or party. <i>Newspapers have become increasingly <b>partisan</b>.</i>
<b>preferential</b>	(of a creditor) having a claim on the receipt of payment from a debtor which will be met before those of other creditors. <i><b>Preferential</b> interest rates may be offered to employees.</i>
<b>prejudiced</b>	Having or showing a dislike or distrust that is derived from prejudice; bigoted. <i>A <b>prejudiced</b> judge.</i>
<b><u>qualified</u></b>	Holding appropriate documentation and officially on record as qualified to perform a specified function or practice a specified skill. <i>Many <b>qualified</b> applicants for the job.</i>
<b><u>restricted</u></b>	Restricted in meaning as e g man in a tall man. <i>Western scientists had only <b>restricted</b> access to the site.</i>
<b><u>skewed</u></b>	Having an oblique or slanting direction or position.
<b>slanted</b>	Having an oblique or slanted direction. <i>A <b>slanted</b> roof.</i>
<b>unfinished</b>	Lacking a surface finish such as paint. <i>The garage door can be supplied <b>unfinished</b> for you to paint yourself.</i>

**bias**

Give a bias to.

*There was evidence of **bias** against foreign applicants.*

**biased**

Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something.

*A **biased** account of the trial.*

**bigot**

A person who is obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, especially one who is prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group.

*Don't let a few small minded **bigots** destroy the good image of the city.*

**bigoted**

Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group.

*An outrageously **bigoted** point of view.*



<b>detachment</b>	A group of troops, aircraft, or ships sent away on a separate mission. <i>He felt a sense of <b>detachment</b> from what was going on.</i>
<u><b>discriminate</b></u>	Make an unjust or prejudicial distinction in the treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. <i>Babies can <b>discriminate</b> between different facial expressions.</i>
<u><b>discriminatory</b></u>	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. <i>A <b>discriminatory</b> tax.</i>
<b>fractional</b>	Relating to or expressed as a fraction, especially a fraction less than one. <i>There was a <b>fractional</b> hesitation before he said yes.</i>
<b>fragmentary</b>	Consisting of small disconnected parts. <i>Excavations have revealed <b>fragmentary</b> remains of masonry.</i>
<u><b>incomplete</b></u>	Not yet finished. <i>His thesis is still <b>incomplete</b>.</i>
<b>incompleteness</b>	The state of being crude and incomplete and imperfect. <i>The study was criticized for <b>incompleteness</b> of data but it stimulated further research.</i>
<u><b>inequality</b></u>	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are not equal. <i>The <b>inequality</b> of the ground hindered their footing.</i>
<u><b>injustice</b></u>	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>
<u><b>intolerant</b></u>	Not tolerant of views, beliefs, or behaviour that differ from one's own. <i>He's recently been diagnosed as gluten <b>intolerant</b>.</i>
<u><b>nearly</b></u>	Closely. <i>In the absence of anyone more <b>nearly</b> related I was designated next of kin.</i>
<b>overtone</b>	(usually plural) an ulterior implicit meaning or quality. <i><b>Overtone</b>s of despair.</i>
<b>partiality</b>	A particular liking or fondness for something. <i>An attack on the <b>partiality</b> of judges.</i>
<b>prejudice</b>	Disadvantage by prejudice. <i>Deep rooted class <b>prejudices</b>.</i>
<b>prejudiced</b>	Emanating from a person's emotions and prejudices. <i>People are <b>prejudiced</b> against us.</i>

<b>racism</b>	Prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism by an individual, community, or institution against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group, typically one that is a minority or marginalized. <i>A programme to combat <b>racism</b>.</i>
<b>retraction</b>	The action of drawing something back or back in. <i>The <b>retraction</b> of the landing gear.</i>
<b>sectarian</b>	(of an action) carried out on the grounds of membership of a sect, denomination, or other group. <i>The <b>sectarian</b> Bolshevism advocated by Moscow.</i>
<u><b>section</b></u>	Commit someone compulsorily to a psychiatric hospital in accordance with a section of a mental health act. <i>A <b>section</b> of face showing the position of the organs of speech.</i>
<u><b>sector</b></u>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The public <b>sector</b>.</i>
<b>serration</b>	A tooth or point of a serrated edge or surface. <i>The <b>serrations</b> of a city skyline.</i>
<u><b>sexist</b></u>	A person with sexist views. <i><b>Sexists</b> have no place in our modern political campaigns.</i>
<u><b>sketchy</b></u>	Giving only major points; lacking completeness. <i>A <b>sketchy</b> neighbourhood.</i>
<u><b>subjective</b></u>	The subjective case. <i>A <b>subjective</b> judgment.</i>
<b>unfinished</b>	Not finished or concluded; incomplete. <i>Her last novel is <b>unfinished</b>.</i>
<b>wreckage</b>	The remains of something that has been badly damaged or destroyed. <i>Firemen had to cut him free from the <b>wreckage</b> of the car.</i>
