## Partially as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Partially" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “partially” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Only in part; to a limited extent.*
- *In part; in some degree; not wholly.*
- *To some extent; in some degree; not wholly.*



## Synonyms of "Partially" as an adverb (18 Words)

<b><u>comparatively</u></b>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was <b>comparatively</b> low.</i>
<b><u>half</u></b>	To the extent of half. <i>The glass was <b>half</b> full.</i>
<b>in part</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in some measure</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>incompletely</b>	In an partial or unfinished manner. <i>Most specimens are <b>incompletely</b> preserved.</i>
<b><u>moderately</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>The event was <b>moderately</b> successful.</i>
<b>not entirely</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

<b>not fully</b>	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; (‘full’ in this sense is used as a combining form.
<b>not totally</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
<b>not wholly</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
<b>part</b>	To some extent partly often used to contrast different parts of something. <i>The city is now <b>part</b> slum <b>part</b> consumer paradise.</i>
<b>partly</b>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>You re only <b>partly</b> right.</i>
<b><u>relatively</u></b>	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>They were very poor but <b>relatively</b> speaking they had been lucky.</i>
<b><u>slightly</u></b>	(with reference to a person’s build) in a slender way. <i>A <b>slightly</b> built girl.</i>
<b><u>somewhat</u></b>	To certain extent or degree. <i>His arguments were <b>somewhat</b> self contradictory.</i>
<b>to some degree</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>to some extent</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
<b>up to a point</b>	To a more central or a more northerly place.



## Usage Examples of "Partially" as an adverb

- *A partially open door.*
- *The work partially fulfills the function of a historical memoir.*
- *He was partially paralyzed.*



## Associations of "Partially" (30 Words)

- about** In rotation or succession.  
*In just **about** a minute.*
- almost** Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.  
*The place was **almost** empty.*
- approximately** Imprecise but fairly close to correct.  
*Lasted **approximately** an hour.*
- bit** The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press.  
*I fell asleep for a **bit**.*

<b>convergent</b>	(of thought) tending to follow only well-established patterns. <i>One of the most bizarre examples of <b>convergent</b> evolution concerns the so called periodical cicadas.</i>
<b>equidistant</b>	At equal distances. <i>The line joins together all points which are <b>equidistant</b> from the two axes.</i>
<b>fairly</b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>They played <b>fairly</b>.</i>
<b>few</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'a'; a small but indefinite number. <i><b>Few</b> women have led troops in battle.</i>
<b>fractional</b>	Small or tiny in amount. <i><b>Fractional</b> crystallization.</i>
<b>half</b>	Half a pint of beer or a similar drink. <i><b>Half</b> a loaf.</i>
<b>incomplete</b>	Not full or finished. <i>His thesis is still <b>incomplete</b>.</i>
<b>intersect</b>	(of two or more things) pass or lie across each other. <i>The area is <b>intersected</b> only by minor roads.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e g least shrew. <i>I never hid the truth <b>least</b> of all from you.</i>
<b>less</b>	(usually preceded by 'no') lower in quality. <i><b>Less</b> time to spend with the family.</i>
<b>little</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e g little grebe. <i>When she was <b>little</b> she was always getting into scrapes.</i>
<b>nearly</b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>In the absence of anyone more <b>nearly</b> related I was designated next of kin.</i>
<b>overlap</b>	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>There was no <b>overlap</b> between their proposals.</i>
<b>part</b>	In part in some degree not wholly. <i>She played a lot of leading <b>parts</b>.</i>
<b>partly</b>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>I felt <b>partly</b> to blame.</i>
<b>portion</b>	The allotment of some amount by dividing something. <i>He ll marry her fast enough when he knows the sum of her <b>portion</b>.</i>
<b>preferably</b>	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own <b>preferably</b> outside the town.</i>

<b>rather</b>	Used to indicate one's preference in a particular matter. <i>I <b>rather</b> think he wants me to marry him.</i>
<b>roadway</b>	A road.
<b>roughly</b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The narrative is <b>roughly</b> speaking contemporary with the earliest of the gospels.</i>
<b>section</b>	Divide into sections. <i>A <b>section</b> of face showing the position of the organs of speech.</i>
<b>several</b>	Separate or respective. <i><b>Several</b> letters came in the mail.</i>
<b>slightly</b>	To a small degree; not considerably. <i>They are all <b>slightly</b> different.</i>
<b>some</b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i><b>Some</b> forty people came.</i>
<b>somewhat</b>	To certain extent or degree. <i>Matters have improved <b>somewhat</b> since then.</i>
<b>superimpose</b>	Place on top of. <i>Can you <b>superimpose</b> the two images.</i>
