Partially as an Adverb

Definitions of "Partially" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “partially” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Only in part; to a limited extent.*
- *In part; in some degree; not wholly.*
- *To some extent; in some degree; not wholly.*



Synonyms of "Partially" as an adverb (18 Words)

<u>comparatively</u>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was comparatively low.</i>
<u>half</u>	To the extent of half. <i>The glass was half full.</i>
in part	To or toward the inside of.
in some measure	To or toward the inside of.
incompletely	In an partial or unfinished manner. <i>Most specimens are incompletely preserved.</i>
<u>moderately</u>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>The event was moderately successful.</i>
not entirely	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

not fully	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; (‘full’ in this sense is used as a combining form.
not totally	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
not wholly	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
part	To some extent partly often used to contrast different parts of something. <i>The city is now part slum part consumer paradise.</i>
partly	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>You re only partly right.</i>
<u>relatively</u>	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>They were very poor but relatively speaking they had been lucky.</i>
<u>slightly</u>	(with reference to a person’s build) in a slender way. <i>A slightly built girl.</i>
<u>somewhat</u>	To certain extent or degree. <i>His arguments were somewhat self contradictory.</i>
to some degree	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
to some extent	Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
up to a point	To a more central or a more northerly place.



Usage Examples of "Partially" as an adverb

- *A partially open door.*
- *The work partially fulfills the function of a historical memoir.*
- *He was partially paralyzed.*



Associations of "Partially" (30 Words)

- about** In rotation or succession.
*In just **about** a minute.*
- almost** Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.
*The place was **almost** empty.*
- approximately** Imprecise but fairly close to correct.
*Lasted **approximately** an hour.*
- bit** The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press.
*I fell asleep for a **bit**.*

convergent	(of thought) tending to follow only well-established patterns. <i>One of the most bizarre examples of convergent evolution concerns the so called periodical cicadas.</i>
equidistant	At equal distances. <i>The line joins together all points which are equidistant from the two axes.</i>
fairly	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>They played fairly.</i>
few	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'a'; a small but indefinite number. <i>Few women have led troops in battle.</i>
fractional	Small or tiny in amount. <i>Fractional crystallization.</i>
half	Half a pint of beer or a similar drink. <i>Half a loaf.</i>
incomplete	Not full or finished. <i>His thesis is still incomplete.</i>
intersect	(of two or more things) pass or lie across each other. <i>The area is intersected only by minor roads.</i>
least	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>I never hid the truth least of all from you.</i>
less	(usually preceded by 'no') lower in quality. <i>Less time to spend with the family.</i>
little	Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e.g. little grebe. <i>When she was little she was always getting into scrapes.</i>
nearly	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>In the absence of anyone more nearly related I was designated next of kin.</i>
overlap	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>There was no overlap between their proposals.</i>
part	In part in some degree not wholly. <i>She played a lot of leading parts.</i>
partly	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>I felt partly to blame.</i>
portion	The allotment of some amount by dividing something. <i>He'll marry her fast enough when he knows the sum of her portion.</i>
preferably	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own preferably outside the town.</i>

rather	Used to indicate one's preference in a particular matter. <i>I rather think he wants me to marry him.</i>
roadway	A road.
roughly	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The narrative is roughly speaking contemporary with the earliest of the gospels.</i>
section	Divide into sections. <i>A section of face showing the position of the organs of speech.</i>
several	Separate or respective. <i>Several letters came in the mail.</i>
slightly	To a small degree; not considerably. <i>They are all slightly different.</i>
some	To some extent quite a lot. <i>Some forty people came.</i>
somewhat	To certain extent or degree. <i>Matters have improved somewhat since then.</i>
superimpose	Place on top of. <i>Can you superimpose the two images.</i>
