amazingly	Very; extremely (usually expressing approval). <i>Amazingly he finished medical school in three years.</i>
awfully	Used as intensifiers. <i>Thanks awfully for the tea Mr Oakley.</i>
conspicuously	In a clearly visible way. <i>His arguments conspicuously lack rigour.</i>
decidedly	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>No Donna said decidedly.</i>
distinctly	(used for emphasis) in a way that is very noticeable or apparent; decidedly. <i>He looked distinctly uncomfortable.</i>
especially	To a great extent; very much. <i>He despised them all especially Sylvester.</i>
exceptionally	To an exceptional degree. <i>The weather was exceptionally mild for the time of the year.</i>
explicitly	In an explicit manner. <i>She has explicitly rejected the theory of patriarchy.</i>
expressly	Explicitly; clearly. <i>She was expressly forbidden to use the stove.</i>
extra	Unusually or exceptionally. <i>Installation will cost about 60 extra.</i>
extraordinarily	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>He did a good job in extraordinarily difficult circumstances.</i>
extremely	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>This is an extremely difficult thing to do.</i>
in particular	To or toward the inside of.
incredibly	To a great degree; extremely. <i>Behind you the coastal hills plunge to the incredibly blue sea backed by the Turkish mountains.</i>
markedly	In a clearly noticeable manner. <i>This advice is markedly different to that last year.</i>
<u>notably</u>	Especially; in particular. <i>A diet low in animal fat protects against potentially fatal diseases notably diabetes.</i>

outstandingly	Exceptionally. Outstandingly beautiful gardens.
peculiarly	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>Some patients were peculiarly difficult to cure.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I think she s really great.</i>
remarkably	In a signal manner. Remarkably she hung on to her job.
singularly	In a strange or eccentric way. <i>You have singularly failed to live up to your promises.</i>
especially	In a special manner. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
specifically	In a way that is exact and clear; precisely. <i>There are three genera in common but these differ specifically.</i>
strikingly	In a way that attracts attention by reason of being unusual, extreme, or prominent. <i>The stories strikingly illustrate the creative power of the imagination.</i>
surprisingly	In a way that causes surprise; unexpectedly. <i>The finale ends surprisingly.</i>
terribly	In a terrible manner. <i>It was all terribly frustrating.</i>
uncommonly	Exceptionally. <i>He is an uncommonly good talker.</i>
uniquely	So as to be unique. <i>A uniquely talented musician.</i>
unusually	To a remarkable degree or extent. <i>There were an unusually large number of excellent performances.</i>
very	In a high degree. <i>His very own car.</i>

defined	Clearly characterized or delimited. <i>A number of clearly defined aims.</i>
dispensation	The act of dispensing (giving out in portions). <i>The laws to which the creator in all his dispensations conforms.</i>
distinct	Constituting a separate entity or part. <i>Trenchant distinctions between right and wrong.</i>
egregious	Outstandingly bad; shocking. <i>An egregious lie.</i>

insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
juncture	A crisis situation or point in time when a critical decision must be made. <i>At such junctures he always had an impulse to leave.</i>
notably	In particular; especially. <i>Such a statement is notably absent from the government s proposals.</i>
noticed	Being perceived or observed. <i>An easily noticed effect on the rate of growth.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>It was obvious a storm was coming in.</i>
particular	A detail. <i>A particular description of the room.</i>
salience	The quality of being particularly noticeable or important; prominence. <i>The political salience of religion has a considerable impact.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
singularly	In a singular manner or to a singular degree. <i>You have singularly failed to live up to your promises.</i>

special	A special offering usually temporary and at a reduced price that is featured in advertising. <i>When I went to arrest him he saw that I was a special.</i>
especially	In a special manner. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
specific	A medicine that has a mitigating effect on a specific disease. <i>I wish I d put more thought into the specifics.</i>
specifically	For a particular purpose. <i>Some collectors maintain spaces specifically to house their larger works of art.</i>
specificity	The quality of belonging or relating uniquely to a particular subject. <i>Add a desirable note of specificity to the discussion.</i>
tailored	Severely simple in line or design. <i>A tailored charcoal grey suit.</i>
unique	A unique person or thing. <i>Certain types of problems have unique solutions.</i>
