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## Associations of "Partner in crime" (30 Words)

<b>arrest</b>	A stoppage or sudden cessation of motion. <i>At least 69 <b>arrests</b> were made.</i>
<b>criminal</b>	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i><b>Criminal</b> in the sight of God and man.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<b>falsification</b>	The act of rendering something false as by fraudulent changes (of documents or measures etc.) or counterfeiting. <i>An investigation into fraud and the <b>falsification</b> of records.</i>
<b>fraud</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>Prosecutions for social security <b>frauds</b>.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Conscious of, affected by, or revealing a feeling of guilt. <i>She was <b>guilty</b> of a serious error of judgement.</i>
<b>illegal</b>	A person living in a country without official authorization. <i><b>Illegal</b> drugs.</i>
<b>infringement</b>	An act that disregards an agreement or a right. <i>The <b>infringement</b> of the right to privacy.</i>
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b><u>perpetrate</u></b>	Carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action). <i><b>Perpetrate</b> a crime.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The abbey was plundered and <b>pillaged</b>.</i>
<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b>.</i>

<b>plagiarism</b>	The practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own. <i>There were accusations of <b>plagiarism</b>.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>Industrial <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>ravish</b>	Force (someone) to have sex against their will. <i>There is no assurance that her infant child will not be <b>ravished</b> from her breast.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Bob thinks my suit cost 70 and even then he thinks I was <b>robbed</b>.</i>
<b>robbery</b>	The action of taking property unlawfully from a person or place by force or threat of force. <i>An armed <b>robbery</b>.</i>
<b>shoplifting</b>	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for <b>shoplifting</b>.</i>
<b>spoliation</b>	The action of ruining or destroying something. <i>The <b>spoliation</b> of the countryside.</i>
<b>steal</b>	Steal a base. <i>A delicious languor was <b>stealing</b> over her.</i>
<b>terrorism</b>	The unlawful use of violence and intimidation, especially against civilians, in the pursuit of political aims. <i>International <b>terrorism</b>.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest <b>theft</b> happened at a garage.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Take by theft. <i>The students have been <b>thieving</b> my favourite art books.</i>
<b>thievery</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty <b>thievery</b>.</i>
<b>transgression</b>	The action of going beyond or overstepping some boundary or limit. <i>The boy was punished for the <b>transgressions</b> of his father.</i>
<b>trespass</b>	Break the law. <i>She is <b>trespassing</b> upon my privacy.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
<b>vandalism</b>	Willful wanton and malicious destruction of the property of others. <i>Surveillance of the building would reduce <b>vandalism</b> and theft.</i>
