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Associations of "Partner in crime" (30 Words)

arrest	A stoppage or sudden cessation of motion. <i>At least 69 arrests were made.</i>
criminal	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>Criminal in the sight of God and man.</i>
despoil	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i>
falsification	The act of rendering something false as by fraudulent changes (of documents or measures etc.) or counterfeiting. <i>An investigation into fraud and the falsification of records.</i>
fraud	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>Prosecutions for social security frauds.</i>
guilty	Conscious of, affected by, or revealing a feeling of guilt. <i>She was guilty of a serious error of judgement.</i>
illegal	A person living in a country without official authorization. <i>Illegal drugs.</i>
infringement	An act that disregards an agreement or a right. <i>The infringement of the right to privacy.</i>
larceny	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
perpetrate	Carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action). <i>Perpetrate a crime.</i>
pillage	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The abbey was plundered and pillaged.</i>
piracy	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air piracy.</i>

plagiarism	The practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own. <i>There were accusations of plagiarism.</i>
rapine	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>Industrial rapine.</i>
ravish	Force (someone) to have sex against their will. <i>There is no assurance that her infant child will not be ravished from her breast.</i>
rob	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Bob thinks my suit cost 70 and even then he thinks I was robbed.</i>
robbery	The action of taking property unlawfully from a person or place by force or threat of force. <i>An armed robbery.</i>
shoplifting	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
spoliation	The action of ruining or destroying something. <i>The spoliation of the countryside.</i>
steal	Steal a base. <i>A delicious languor was stealing over her.</i>
terrorism	The unlawful use of violence and intimidation, especially against civilians, in the pursuit of political aims. <i>International terrorism.</i>
theft	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest theft happened at a garage.</i>
thieve	Take by theft. <i>The students have been thieving my favourite art books.</i>
thievery	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty thievery.</i>
transgression	The action of going beyond or overstepping some boundary or limit. <i>The boy was punished for the transgressions of his father.</i>
trespass	Break the law. <i>She is trespassing upon my privacy.</i>
usurpation	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
vandalism	Willful wanton and malicious destruction of the property of others. <i>Surveillance of the building would reduce vandalism and theft.</i>

violation

A crime less serious than a felony.
