- *Any of a number of individuals with interests and investments in a business or enterprise, among whom expenses, profits, and losses are shared.*
- *A person's partner in marriage.*
- *A person with whom one has sex; a lover.*
- *Either member of a married couple or of an established unmarried couple.*
- *An associate in an activity or endeavor or sphere of common interest.*

- A person or group that takes part with another or others in doing something.
- A person who is a member of a partnership.

A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.

*He was forced to dismiss his closest political **ally**.*

associate

A person with subordinate membership in a society, institution, or commercial enterprise.

*A close **associate** of the Minister.*

Something superior in quality or condition or effect.

co-worker

An associate that one works with.

collaborator

Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force.

*His **collaborator** on the book.*

colleague	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
companion	A person who shares the experiences of another, especially when these are unpleasant or unwelcome. <i>Steve and his live in companion.</i>
comrade	(among men) a colleague or a fellow member of an organization. <i>An old college comrade.</i>
consort	The husband or wife of a reigning monarch. <i>Queen Victoria and her consort Prince Albert.</i>
cooperator	An associate in an activity or endeavor or sphere of common interest.
fellow worker	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman.
husband	A married man considered in relation to his spouse. <i>She and her husband are both retired.</i>
husband and wife	A married man; a woman's partner in marriage.
man	Human beings in general the human race. <i>The two of them lived for a time as man and wife.</i>
married person	A person who is married.
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>My best mate Steve.</i>
my friend	A person who backs a politician or a team etc.
pardner	An associate in an activity or endeavor or sphere of common interest. <i>I m here with my pardner Tex.</i>
spouse	A person's partner in marriage.
teammate	A fellow member of a team. <i>It was his first start against his former teammates.</i>
twosome	A game or dance for or involving two people. <i>An inseparable twosome.</i>
wife	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>He and his wife are keen gardeners.</i>

- attend** Occur with or as a result of.
*I must **attend** to this matter.*
- chaperone** Accompany as a chaperone.
*She **chaperoned** the children at all times.*
- conduct** Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction.
***Conduct** an orchestra Barenboim **conducted** the Chicago symphony for years.*
- convoy** (of a warship or armed troops) accompany (a group of ships or vehicles) for protection.
*The trucks **convoyed** the cars across the battle zone.*
- follow** Come as a logical consequence follow logically.
*When he lectures I cannot **follow**.*

go along with	Move away from a place into another direction.
go with	Be ranked or compare.
guide	Use as a guide. <i>He guided her to the front row and sat beside her.</i>
help	Help to some food help with food or drink. <i>I served him three times and after that he helped himself.</i>
keep someone company	Keep in a certain state, position, or activity.
lead	Cause something to pass or lead somewhere. <i>There will be specific areas or skills in which other nations lead the world.</i>
<u>pilot</u>	Be the pilot of an aircraft or ship. <i>The pilot flew to Cuba.</i>
<u>see</u>	Go to see for professional or business reasons. <i>I could see through the windows.</i>
show	Show in or as in a picture. <i>A postcard showing the Wicklow Mountains.</i>
show someone the way	Give expression to.
<u>steer</u>	Direct (oneself) somewhere. <i>The teacher steered the gifted students towards the more challenging courses.</i>
tag along with	Attach a tag or label to.
take	Of a plant or seed take root or begin to grow germinate. <i>Winner takes all.</i>
travel with	Travel from place to place, as for the purpose of finding work, preaching, or acting as a judge.
<u>usher</u>	Take (someone) to their seats, as in theaters or auditoriums. <i>The usher showed us to our seats.</i>

comrade	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>Comrades in arms.</i>
conjoin	Join; combine. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>
consort	Agree or be in harmony with. <i>You chose to consort with the enemy.</i>
couple	Bring two objects, ideas, or people together. <i>A couple of girls were playing marbles.</i>
estranged	(of a person) no longer close or affectionate to someone; alienated. <i>His estranged wife.</i>
ex	The 24th letter of the Roman alphabet. <i>All his exes live in Texas.</i>
fellow	A man who is the lover of a man or woman. <i>There s a fellow at the door.</i>
friendship	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>Old ties of love and friendship.</i>
husband	A married man considered in relation to his spouse. <i>She husbanded their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
marriage	Two people who are married to each other. <i>A happy marriage.</i>
married	Married people. <i>Married bliss.</i>
marry	Perform a marriage ceremony. <i>Eric asked me to marry him.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>See you then mate.</i>
morganatic	(of marriages) of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a morganatic marriage with a German born actress.</i>
newlywed	Someone recently married.

- peer** A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.
*Faye **peered** at her with suspicion.*
- polygamy** A pattern of mating in which an animal has more than one mate.
- spouse** A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
- suitor** A prospective buyer of a business or corporation.
*The company agreed to negotiate with its **suitor**.*
- wed** Having been taken in marriage.
*They were **wed** in London.*
- wife** The wife of a person with a specified occupation.
*A clergy **wife**.*
