Associations of "Partners" (30 Words)

<u>affiliate</u>	A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization. <i>The firm established links with American affiliates.</i>
associate	A partner or companion in business or at work. <i>Associates in the law firm bill at a lower rate than do partners.</i>
beau	A rich, fashionable young man; a dandy.
bigamy	Having two spouses at the same time.
cohabit	Live together and have a sexual relationship without being married. <i>Mary is now cohabiting with Paul.</i>
colleague	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
<u>companion</u>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>She brought along her companion whose drab attire set off her employer's brilliance.</i>
compatriot	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his compatriot Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<u>comrade</u>	A fellow member of the Communist Party. <i>Greetings comrade.</i>
conjoin	Make contact or come together. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>
<u>consort</u>	Habitually associate with (someone), typically with the disapproval of others. <i>You chose to consort with the enemy.</i>
<u>couple</u>	Engage in sexual intercourse. <i>Clean the stains with a couple squirts dishwashing liquid.</i>
<u>estranged</u>	Caused to be unloved. <i>His estranged wife.</i>

ex	Out of fashion. <i>All his exes live in Texas.</i>
fellow	A thing of the same kind as or otherwise associated with another. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his fellows.</i>
friendship	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>The foreign ministers extended to eastern Europe the hand of friendship.</i>
husband	Use cautiously and frugally. <i>She and her husband are both retired.</i>
marriage	The state of being a married couple voluntarily joined for life (or until divorce). <i>Their marriage was conducted in the chapel.</i>
married	A person who is married. <i>A happily married man.</i>
marry	Join in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don't marry well with salmon.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>See you then mate.</i>
morganatic	(of marriages) of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a morganatic marriage with a German born actress.</i>
newlywed	Someone recently married.
peer	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>Faye peered at her with suspicion.</i>
polygamy	The practice or custom of having more than one wife or husband at the same time.
spouse	A person's partner in marriage.
suitor	A man who courts a woman. <i>She decided to marry her suitor.</i>
wed	The fourth day of the week; the third working day. <i>They wed a week after meeting.</i>
wife	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>A clergy wife.</i>
workmate	A person with whom one works.
