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## Associations of "Partners" (30 Words)

<b><u>affiliate</u></b>	A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization. <i>The firm established links with American <b>affiliates</b>.</i>
<b>associate</b>	A partner or companion in business or at work. <i><b>Associates</b> in the law firm bill at a lower rate than do partners.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A rich, fashionable young man; a dandy.
<b>bigamy</b>	Having two spouses at the same time.
<b>cohabit</b>	Live together and have a sexual relationship without being married. <i>Mary is now <b>cohabiting</b> with Paul.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>She brought along her <b>companion</b> whose drab attire set off her employer's brilliance.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b><u>comrade</u></b>	A fellow member of the Communist Party. <i>Greetings <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Make contact or come together. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>
<b><u>consort</u></b>	Habitually associate with (someone), typically with the disapproval of others. <i>You chose to <b>consort</b> with the enemy.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	Engage in sexual intercourse. <i>Clean the stains with a <b>couple</b> squirts dishwashing liquid.</i>
<b><u>estranged</u></b>	Caused to be unloved. <i>His <b>estranged</b> wife.</i>

<b>ex</b>	Out of fashion. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<b>fellow</b>	A thing of the same kind as or otherwise associated with another. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>
<b>friendship</b>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>The foreign ministers extended to eastern Europe the hand of <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b>husband</b>	Use cautiously and frugally. <i>She and her <b>husband</b> are both retired.</i>
<b>marriage</b>	The state of being a married couple voluntarily joined for life (or until divorce). <i>Their <b>marriage</b> was conducted in the chapel.</i>
<b>married</b>	A person who is married. <i>A happily <b>married</b> man.</i>
<b>marry</b>	Join in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don't <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>See you then <b>mate</b>.</i>
<b>morganatic</b>	(of marriages) of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a <b>morganatic</b> marriage with a German born actress.</i>
<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<b>peer</b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>Faye <b>peered</b> at her with suspicion.</i>
<b>polygamy</b>	The practice or custom of having more than one wife or husband at the same time.
<b>spouse</b>	A person's partner in marriage.
<b>suitor</b>	A man who courts a woman. <i>She decided to marry her <b>suitor</b>.</i>
<b>wed</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day. <i>They <b>wed</b> a week after meeting.</i>
<b>wife</b>	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>A clergy <b>wife</b>.</i>
<b>workmate</b>	A person with whom one works.
