contemptible	Deserving contempt; despicable. <i>A display of contemptible cowardice.</i>
deplorable	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>Children living in deplorable conditions.</i>
despicable	Morally reprehensible. <i>A despicable crime.</i>
feeble	Lacking physical strength, especially as a result of age or illness. <i>A feeble voice.</i>
hapless	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i>The hapless victims of the disaster.</i>
inadequate	Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>A sad solitary inadequate man.</i>
insubstantial	Lacking in nutritive value. <i>The huts are relatively few and insubstantial.</i>

<u>insufficient</u>	Not enough; inadequate. <i>Insufficient funds.</i>
lamentable	(of an event, action, or attitude) unfortunate; regrettable. <i>The industry is in a lamentable state.</i>
meagre	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>They were forced to supplement their meagre earnings.</i>
<u>miserable</u>	Pitiably small or inadequate. <i>Their happiness made Anne feel even more miserable.</i>
misfortunate	Especially of a person: unfortunate.
moving	Producing strong emotion, especially sadness or sympathy. <i>She laid her case of destitution before him in a very moving letter.</i>
<u>negligible</u>	Not worth considering. <i>The effect was negligible.</i>
paltry	Contemptibly small in amount. <i>A paltry wage.</i>
piteous	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>A piteous cry.</i>
pitiable	Contemptibly poor or small. <i>Pitiable lack of character.</i>
<u>pitiful</u>	Compassionate. <i>Two children in a very pitiful state.</i>
<u>plaintive</u>	Expressing sorrow. <i>A plaintive cry.</i>
<u>poignant</u>	Arousing affect. <i>Poignant anxiety.</i>
poor	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>Many people are eating a very poor diet.</i>
ridiculous	Deserving or inviting derision or mockery; absurd. <i>That ridiculous tartan cap.</i>
silly	Denoting fielding positions very close to the batsman. <i>He often drank himself silly.</i>
<u>sorry</u>	Bad; unfortunate. <i>I felt sorry for the poor boys working for him.</i>
<u>stirring</u>	Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement. <i>Stirring songs.</i>
touching	Arousing feelings of sympathy or gratitude. <i>His gratitude was simple and touching.</i>

<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Shops should take back unsatisfactory goods.</i>
woeful	Affected by or full of grief or woe. <i>Woeful errors of judgment.</i>
worthless	Lacking in usefulness or value. <i>That promise is worthless.</i>
wretched	(of a person) in a very unhappy or unfortunate state. <i>A wretched life.</i>

calamitous	Having extremely unfortunate or dire consequences; bringing ruin. A calamitous defeat.
catastrophic	Relating to geological catastrophism. The body undergoes catastrophic collapse towards the state of a black hole.
defeated	People who are defeated. The defeated enemy.
dejected	Affected or marked by low spirits. Is dejected but trying to look cheerful.
deplorable	Deserving strong condemnation; completely unacceptable. Children living in deplorable conditions.
disastrous	Highly unsuccessful. United made a disastrous start to the season.

hapless	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>A hapless victim.</i>
inauspicious	Not auspicious; boding ill. <i>This is the inauspicious star of disaster.</i>
<u>inferior</u>	An inferior letter figure or symbol. <i>Inferior alveolar artery.</i>
lamentable	(of an event, action, or attitude) unfortunate; regrettable. <i>A lamentable decision.</i>
<u>loser</u>	A contestant who loses the contest. <i>A ragtag community of rejects and losers.</i>
<u>miserable</u>	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>Their happiness made Anne feel even more miserable.</i>
mournful	Feeling, expressing, or inducing sadness, regret, or grief. <i>Her large mournful eyes.</i>
moving	In motion. <i>Her ambition was to be in moving pictures or the movies.</i>
piteous	Deserving or arousing pity. <i>Piteous appeals for help.</i>
pitiable	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i>A pitiable imitation of the real thing.</i>
<u>pitiful</u>	Compassionate. <i>A pitiful attempt to impress her.</i>
<u>pity</u>	A cause for regret or disappointment. <i>It s a pity he couldn t do it.</i>
regrettable	Deserving regret. <i>It s regrettable that she didn t go to college.</i>
ruinous	Disastrous or destructive. <i>The castle is ruinous.</i>
ruth	A feeling of sympathy and sorrow for the misfortunes of others.
sad	Of things that make you feel sad. <i>Better by far that you should forget and smile Than that you should remember and be sad.</i>
sadly	To a regrettable extent; regrettably. <i>His schemes went sadly awry.</i>
sadness	The state of being sad. <i>It is one of life s sadnesses.</i>

- sorry** Feeling regret or penitence.
*He said he was **sorry** he had upset me.*
- touching** Arousing affect.
*His gratitude was simple and **touching**.*
- tragic** Causing or characterized by extreme distress or sorrow.
*A **tragic** accident.*
- unfortunate** Not favored by fortune; marked or accompanied by or resulting in ill fortune.
*An **unfortunate** turn of events.*
- unlucky** Marked by or promising bad fortune- W.H.Prescott.
*An **unlucky** defeat.*
- wretched** Used to express anger or annoyance.
*I felt so **wretched** because I thought I might never see you again.*
