<b><u>bribe</u></b>	A sum of money or other inducement offered or given to bribe someone. <i>Lawmakers were caught accepting <b>bribes</b> to bring in legalized gambling.</i>
<b>final payment</b>	The final match between the winners of all previous matches in an elimination tournament.
<b>issue</b>	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>The canyon had only one <b>issue</b>.</i>
<b>proceeds</b>	Money obtained from an event or activity. <i><b>Proceeds</b> from the event will go to aid the work of the charity.</i>

<b>return</b>	A good rate of return. <i>He won the point on a cross court <b>return</b>.</i>
<b>reward</b>	A sum offered for information leading to the solving of a crime, the detection of a criminal, etc. <i>Reaping the <b>rewards</b> of generosity.</i>
<b>take</b>	A particular version of or approach to something. <i>His own whimsical <b>take</b> on life.</i>
<b>takings</b>	The income or profit arising from such transactions as the sale of land or other property.
<b>wages</b>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>
<b>yield</b>	A financial return. <i>An annual dividend <b>yield</b> of 20 per cent.</i>

## Associations of "Payoff" (30 Words)

<b>accomplishment</b>	Skill or ability in an activity. <i>Long distance running was another of her <b>accomplishments</b>.</i>
<b>compensation</b>	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>He is seeking <b>compensation</b> for injuries suffered at work.</i>
<b>creditor</b>	A person or company to whom money is owing. <i>He sold his Ferraris to pay off his <b>creditors</b>.</i>
<b>debt</b>	An obligation to pay or do something. <i>A way to reduce Third World <b>debt</b>.</i>
<b>debtor</b>	A person who owes a creditor; someone who has the obligation of paying a debt. <i>Generally <b>debtors</b> must negotiate with each creditor separately.</i>
<b>indemnify</b>	Make amends for; pay compensation for. <i>The company has taken out insurance to <b>indemnify</b> its directors against liability when acting for the group.</i>
<b>liquidate</b>	Get rid of (someone who may be a threat) by killing. <i>If the company was <b>liquidated</b> there would be enough funds released to honour the debts.</i>
<b>meed</b>	A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some <b>meed</b> of approbation.</i>
<b>overdue</b>	Having been needed for some time. <i>I was already a week and a half <b>overdue</b>.</i>

<b>overpayment</b>	The act of paying too much. <i>A refund for <b>overpayment</b> of tax.</i>
<b>paid</b>	Yielding a fair profit. <i>A <b>paid</b> check.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Give (someone) money that is due for work done, goods received, or a debt incurred. <i>I ll <b>pay</b> for your ticket.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The act of paying money. <i>A compensation <b>payment</b> of 2500.</i>
<b>perquisite</b>	An incidental benefit awarded for certain types of employment (especially if it is regarded as a right). <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b>premium</b>	Having or reflecting superior quality or value. <i>Customers are reluctant to pay a <b>premium</b> for organic fruit.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	The act of compensating for service or loss or injury. <i>He was <b>recompensed</b> for the wasted time.</i>
<b>refund</b>	Pay back. <i>Please <b>refund</b> me my money.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i><b>Reimbursement</b> of everyday medical costs.</i>
<b>remunerate</b>	Make payment to; compensate. <i>They should be <b>remunerated</b> fairly for their work.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Money paid for work or a service. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<b>reparation</b>	The action of repairing something. <i>An act for which there is no <b>reparation</b>.</i>
<b>repay</b>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>The manager has given me another chance and I m desperate to <b>repay</b> that faith.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	The action of paying back a loan. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>requite</b>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>To win enough to <b>requite</b> my friends.</i>
<b>restitution</b>	The restoration of something to its original state. <i><b>Restitution</b> of the damaged mucosa.</i>
<b>return</b>	A returning officer s announcement of an election result. <i>His gross income was enough that he had to file a tax <b>return</b>.</i>

<b><u>revert</u></b>	Go back to a previous state. <i>I <b>reverted</b> to Islam five years ago.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>The holiday was a <b>reward</b> for 40 years service with the company.</i>
<b>unpaid</b>	(of work or a period of leave) undertaken without payment. <i><b>Unpaid</b> wages.</i>
<b><u>wages</u></b>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>
