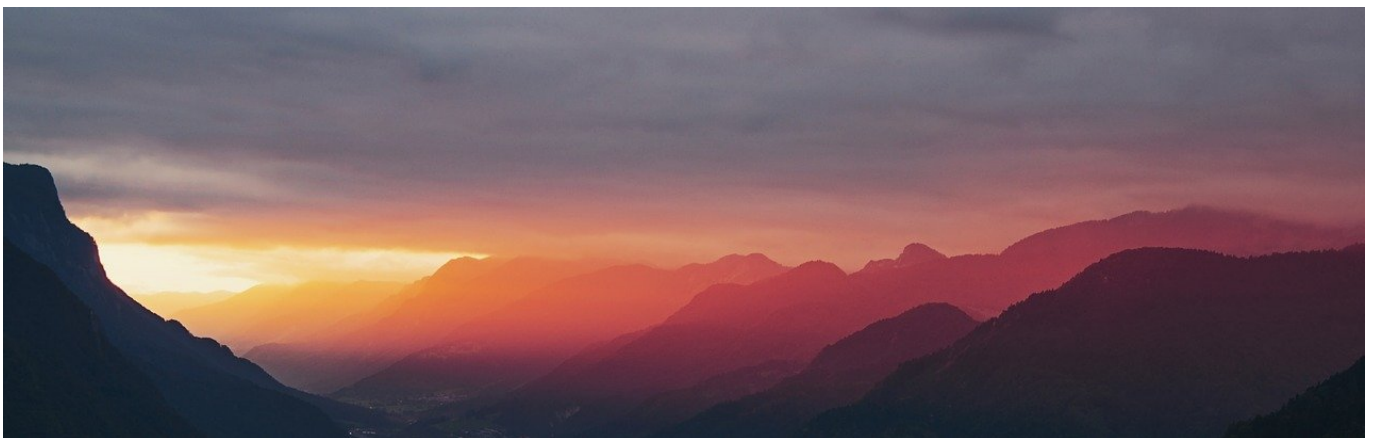

## Synonyms of "Peaked" as an adjective (7 Words)

**ailing**

Somewhat ill or prone to illness.  
*My poor **ailing** grandmother.*

**indisposed**

Somewhat ill or prone to illness.  
*Feeling a bit **indisposed** today.*

**poorly**

Somewhat ill or prone to illness.  
*Feeling **poorly**.*

**seedy**

Full of seeds.  
*As **seedy** as a fig.*

**sickly**

(of a place or climate) causing or characterized by unhealthiness.  
*A **sickly** child.*

**under the weather**

Lower in rank, power, or authority.

**unwell**

Ill.  
*Is **unwell** and can't come to work.*



## Usage Examples of "Peaked" as an adjective

- *A peaked cap.*
- *The island's peaked hills.*
- *You look a little peaked.*
- *The peaked ceiling.*



## Associations of "Peaked" (30 Words)

### **acme**

The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development.  
*Physics is the **acme** of scientific knowledge.*

### **apex**

Turn (a corner) very close to the edge of the track.  
*The central bank is at the **apex** of the financial system.*

### **apogee**

The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination.  
*A film which was the **apogee** of German expressionist cinema.*



<b>climactic</b>	Acting as a culmination or resolution to a series of events; forming an exciting climax. <i>The film s <b>climactic</b> scenes.</i>
<b><u>closing</u></b>	The act of closing something. <i>The <b>closing</b> scene of the film.</i>
<b>completion</b>	A successful forward pass in football. <i>The risk stays with the seller until <b>completion</b>.</i>
<b>crest</b>	In medieval times, an emblem used to decorate a helmet. <i>She <b>crested</b> a hill and saw the valley spread out before her.</i>
<b><u>culminate</u></b>	Reach the highest or most decisive point. <i>The helmet <b>culminated</b> in a crest.</i>
<b>culmination</b>	A heavenly body's highest celestial point above an observer's horizon. <i>The deal marked the <b>culmination</b> of years of negotiation.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	Exciting or impressive. <i>A <b>dramatic</b> sunset.</i>
<b><u>elevation</u></b>	The event of something being raised upward. <i>His <b>elevation</b> to cardinal.</i>
<b><u>final</u></b>	The final match between the winners of all previous matches in an elimination tournament. <i>The judge s decision is <b>final</b>.</i>
<b>heyday</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its <b>heyday</b> in 1964.</i>
<b>jag</b>	Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. <i>He clutched a <b>jag</b> of the rock.</i>
<b><u>lofty</u></b>	Having or displaying great dignity or nobility. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and <b>lofty</b> ideals.</i>
<b><u>maximum</u></b>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>Production levels are near their <b>maximum</b>.</i>
<b>meridian</b>	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>The European Broadcasting Area extends from the Atlantic to the <b>meridian</b> 40 E.</i>
<b>minaret</b>	Slender tower with balconies.
<b>nadir</b>	The point below the observer that is directly opposite the zenith on the imaginary sphere against which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>Asking that question was the <b>nadir</b> of my career.</i>
<b><u>pinnacle</u></b>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the <b>pinnacle</b> of his career.</i>

<b><u>plateau</u></b>	Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The industry s problems have <b>plateaued</b> out.</i>
<b><u>summit</u></b>	Reach the summit of a mountain or hill. <i>Two binding treaties were agreed at the <b>summit</b>.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics ran out of <b>superlatives</b> to describe him.</i>
<b>top</b>	Provide with a top or finish the top of a structure. <i>She <b>topped</b> her performance of last year.</i>
<b>towering</b>	Extremely tall, especially in comparison with the surroundings. <i>His <b>towering</b> anger.</i>
<b><u>unsurpassed</u></b>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
<b><u>upper</u></b>	Higher in place or position. <i>Leather <b>uppers</b>.</i>
<b>windup</b>	Operated by a mechanism. <i><b>Windup</b> toys.</i>
<b><u>zenith</u></b>	The point in the sky or celestial sphere directly above an observer. <i>The sun was well past the <b>zenith</b>.</i>
