### Definitions of "Peasant" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “peasant” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An ignorant, rude, or unsophisticated person.*
- *A poor smallholder or agricultural labourer of low social status (chiefly in historical use or with reference to subsistence farming in poorer countries.*
- *One of a (chiefly European) class of agricultural laborers.*
- *A country person.*
- *A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement.*



## Synonyms of "Peasant" as a noun (24 Words)

- barbarian** An uncultured or brutish person.  
*You arrogant **barbarian**.*
- boor** A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement.  
*At last the big obnoxious **boor** had been dealt a stunning blow for his uncouth and belligerent manner.*
- bucolic** A pastoral poem.
- bumpkin** An unsophisticated or socially awkward person from the countryside.  
*She thought Tom a bit of a country **bumpkin**.*
- churl** A miser.  
*This trio are used whenever some **churl** wants to have a pop at progressive rock.*
- clown** A comic entertainer, especially one in a circus, wearing a traditional costume and exaggerated make-up.  
*A circus **clown**.*

<b>country bumpkin</b>	A particular geographical region of indefinite boundary (usually serving some special purpose or distinguished by its people or culture or geography).
<b>countryman</b>	A man who lives in the country and has country ways. <i>They trust a fellow <b>countryman</b>.</i>
<b>countrywoman</b>	A man who lives in the country and has country ways. <i>She was a <b>countrywoman</b> through and through.</i>
<b>farmhand</b>	A hired hand on a farm.
<b>goth</b>	One of the Teutonic people who invaded the Roman Empire in the 3rd to 5th centuries.
<b>lout</b>	An uncouth and aggressive man or boy. <i>He ended up brawling with a <b>lout</b> outside a curry house.</i>
<b>oaf</b>	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy <b>oafs</b>.</i>
<b><u>provincial</u></b>	(Roman Catholic Church) an official in charge of an ecclesiastical province acting under the superior general of a religious order. <i>The general of the Jesuits receives monthly reports from the <b>provincials</b>.</i>
<b><u>rustic</u></b>	An unsophisticated country person. <i>They paused to watch the <b>rustics</b> dance and carouse.</i>
<b><u>serf</u></b>	A person who is bound to the land and owned by the feudal lord.
<b>small farmer</b>	The slender part of the back.
<b>son of the soil</b>	A male human offspring.
<b>swain</b>	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman.
<b>tike</b>	A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement.
<b>tyke</b>	A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement. <i><b>Tyke</b> hockey.</i>
<b>village idiot</b>	A mainly residential district of Manhattan; 'the Village' became a home for many writers and artists in the 20th century.
<b>villein</b>	(in medieval England) a feudal tenant entirely subject to a lord or manor to whom he paid dues and services in return for land.
<b>yokel</b>	An uneducated and unsophisticated person from the countryside.

- agricultural** Relating to farming or agriculture.

- agriculture** A large-scale farming enterprise.
- botanist** An expert in or student of the scientific study of plants.  
*A **botanist** announced he d bred a new and beautiful variety of orchid.*
- bucolic** A country person.  
*A pleasant **bucolic** scene.*

<b>countryside</b>	The inhabitants of countryside areas. <i>They explored the surrounding <b>countryside</b>.</i>
<b>cowhand</b>	A person employed to tend cattle or to run a ranch.
<b>crop</b>	Prepare for crops. <i>She has her hair cut in a short <b>crop</b>.</i>
<b>cultivator</b>	A person or thing that cultivates something. <i>Rotary <b>cultivators</b> are ideal in the kitchen garden.</i>
<b>farmer</b>	A person to whom the collection of taxes was contracted for a fee.
<b>farmhouse</b>	House for a farmer and family. <i>A <b>farmhouse</b> kitchen.</i>
<b>farming</b>	Relating to farming or agriculture. <i>Sheep <b>farming</b>.</i>
<b>gardener</b>	Someone employed to work in a garden. <i>I m a keen <b>gardener</b>.</i>
<b>harvest</b>	Gather a crop as a harvest. <i>They gathered a <b>harvest</b> of examples.</i>
<b>idyll</b>	An episode of such pastoral or romantic charm as to qualify as the subject of a poetic idyll. <i>The rural <b>idyll</b> remains strongly evocative in most industrialized societies.</i>
<b>intelligentsia</b>	An educated and intellectual elite. <i>The belief that the liberal <b>intelligentsia</b> is ruining the country.</i>
<b>laity</b>	In Christianity, members of a religious community that do not have the priestly responsibilities of ordained clergy.
<b>peon</b>	A Spanish American day labourer or unskilled farm worker. <i>The elder son is a <b>peon</b> at a nearby school.</i>
<b>provincial</b>	Local newspapers, as contrasted with national ones. <i>In that well educated company I felt uncomfortably <b>provincial</b>.</i>
<b>rancher</b>	A person who owns or operates a ranch.
<b>reaper</b>	Someone who helps to gather the harvest.
<b>rural</b>	In, relating to, or characteristic of the countryside rather than the town. <i>Large <b>rural</b> households.</i>
<b>rustic</b>	Awkwardly simple and provincial. <i><b>Rustic</b> pottery.</i>
<b>scythe</b>	Cut with a scythe. <i>You may want hardy infantry troops to <b>scythe</b> down the opposition.</i>
<b>serf</b>	(Middle Ages) a person who is bound to the land and owned by the feudal lord.



<b>serfdom</b>	The state of a serf. <i>The liberation of the peasants from <b>serfdom</b>.</i>
<b>shopkeeper</b>	A merchant who owns or manages a shop.
<b>vassalage</b>	The state of a serf.
<b>vendible</b>	Fit to be offered for sale.
<b>yeoman</b>	A member of the yeomanry force.
