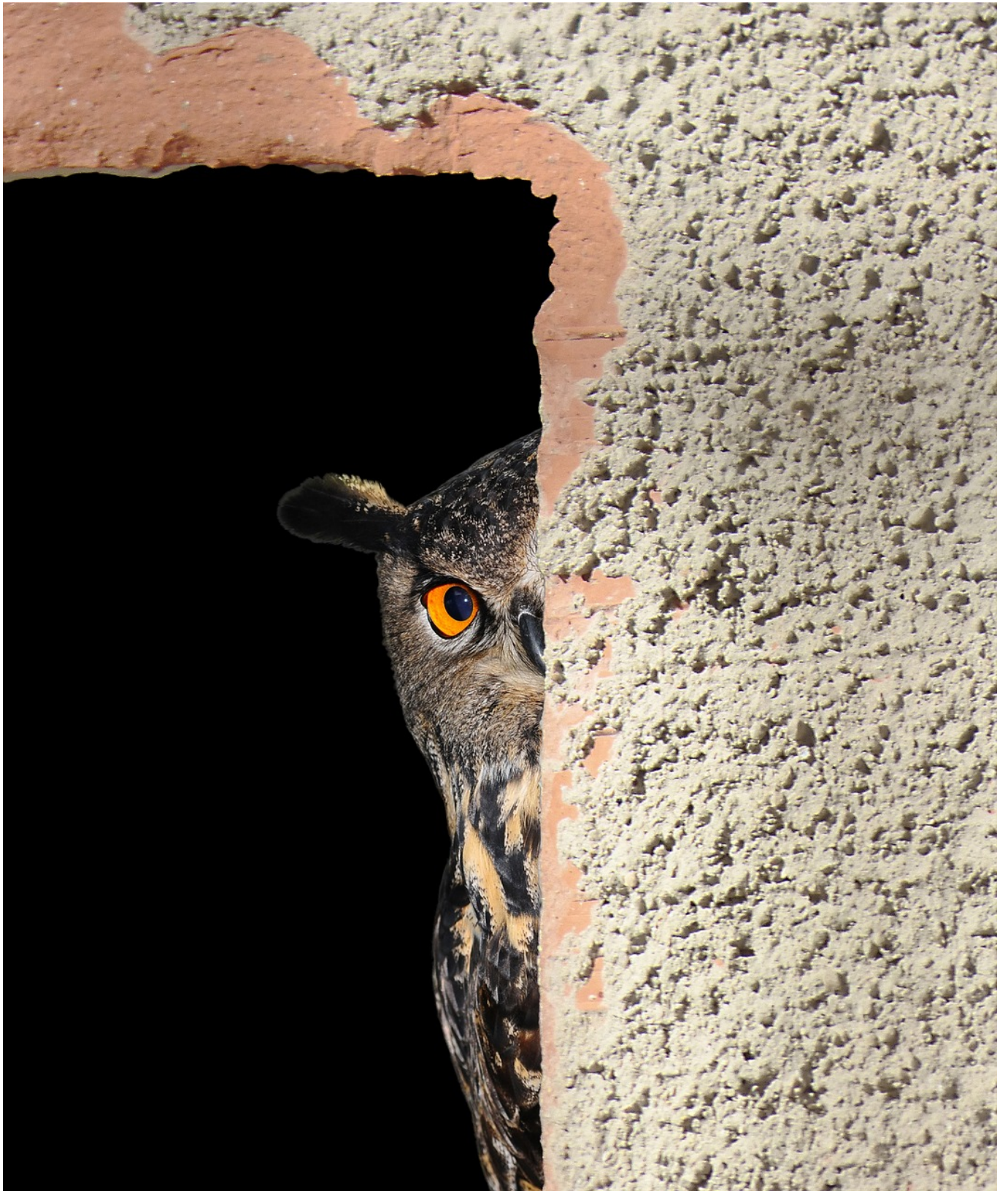

- brief look** A condensed written summary or abstract.
- glance** A stroke with the bat's face turned slantwise to deflect the ball slightly.
*I stole a **glance** at John.*
- glimpse** A momentary or partial view.
*During the interview he offered a behind the scenes **glimpse** of television.*
- look** An expression of a feeling or thought by looking.
*He went out to have a **look**.*
- peep** A momentary or partial view of something.
*Black curls and a **peep** of gold earring.*
- peer** A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.
- quick look** Any area of the body that is highly sensitive to pain (as the flesh underneath the skin or a fingernail or toenail).
- secret look** Something that should remain hidden from others (especially information that is not to be passed on).
- sneaky look** The feelings expressed on a person's face.

- *Look quickly or furtively.*

- *Protrude slightly so as to be just visible.*

Come into sight or view.

| cast a brief look | Select to play, sing, or dance a part in a play, movie, musical, opera, or ballet. |
| come into sight | Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress. |
| come into view | Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress. |
| come to light | Happen as a result. |
| <u>emerge</u> | Recover from or survive a difficult situation. <i>The economy has started to emerge from recession.</i> |
| glance | Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>Ginny glanced at her watch.</i> |
| glint | Be shiny, as if wet. <i>His eyes glinted angrily.</i> |
| have a peek | Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner. |
| have a peep | Have sex with; archaic use. |
| issue | Make out and issue. <i>Licences were issued indiscriminately to any company.</i> |
| look | Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>He thought she wasn't looking.</i> |
| look hurriedly | Have faith or confidence in. |
| <u>loom</u> | Weave on a loom. <i>Large shadows loomed on the canyon wall.</i> |
| make an appearance | Constitute the essence of. |
| peep | Cause to appear. <i>The new moon peeped through the tree tops.</i> |
| <u>peer</u> | Look searchingly. <i>For yet a many of your horsemen peer.</i> |
| peer out | Look searchingly. |
| pop up | Hit or strike. |
| present itself | Represent abstractly, for example in a painting, drawing, or sculpture. |
| present oneself | Give an exhibition of to an interested audience. |
| put in an appearance | Adapt. |
| show | Show in or as in a picture. <i>He ceased early in his career to show his work.</i> |

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| show its face | Establish the validity of something, as by an example, explanation or experiment. |
| show one's face | Take (someone) to their seats, as in theaters or auditoriums. |
| sneak a look | Pass on stealthily. |
| spring up | Spring back; spring away from an impact. |
| <u>spy</u> | Watch, observe, or inquire secretly. <i>He could spy a figure in the distance.</i> |
| <u>surface</u> | Rise or come up to the surface of the water or the ground. <i>A small path surfaced with terracotta tiles.</i> |
| take a secret look | Make use of or accept for some purpose. |
| take a sly look | Lay claim to; as of an idea. |
| take a stealthy look | Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route. |



Usage Examples of "Peek" as a verb

- *Faces peeked from behind twitched curtains.*
- *I only peeked-I didn't see anything interesting.*
- *His socks were so full of holes his toes peeked through.*

- askance** (used especially of glances) directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy.
*A waiter looked **askance** at his jeans.*

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| contented | Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I felt warm and contented.</i> |
| disapproving | Expressing or manifesting disapproval. <i>He shot a disapproving glance at her.</i> |
| fixate | Become fixed (on). <i>Subjects fixated a central point.</i> |
| gaze | A steady intent look. <i>He turned following her gaze.</i> |
| glance | Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>The stone glanced off a crag and hit Tom on the head.</i> |
| glimpse | Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>She caught a glimpse of the ocean.</i> |
| hairstyle | The arrangement of the hair (especially a woman's hair). |
| look | Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>I don't like the looks of this place.</i> |
| observing | Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception. |
| onlooker | Someone who looks on. <i>A crowd of fascinated onlookers.</i> |
| probation | A process of testing or observing the character or abilities of a person who is new to a role or job. <i>Probation is part of the sentencing process.</i> |
| rummage | A thorough search for something (often causing disorder or confusion). <i>He rummaged in his pocket for a handkerchief.</i> |
| searching | Thoroughly scrutinizing, especially in a disconcerting way. <i>A searching investigation of their past dealings.</i> |
| see | Go to see for a social visit. <i>This program will be seen all over the world.</i> |
| seem | Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>I seem to be misunderstood by everyone.</i> |
| show | Show in or as in a picture. <i>Greenough was the only other rider clear in round one but she failed to show for the tiebreaker.</i> |
| sidelong | Inclining or directed to one side. <i>Sidelong glances.</i> |
| sideways | Denoting a job or position at the same level as one previously held rather than one resulting from promotion or demotion. <i>The car slipped sideways into the ditch.</i> |

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| smug | Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction. <i>He was feeling smug after his win.</i> |
| squint | The act of squinting looking with the eyes partly closed. <i>I had a bad squint.</i> |
| stare | Look at with fixed eyes. <i>Her grey eyes stared back at him.</i> |
| staring | Open and fixed as if in fear or wonder. <i>Stark staring mad.</i> |
| suspiciously | In a way that arouses suspicion or distrust. <i>What s going on I asked suspiciously.</i> |
| throng | Press tightly together or cram. <i>A crowd thronged the station.</i> |
| visit | Pay a brief visit. <i>There was nothing to do but visit with one another.</i> |
| watch | A watchman or group of watchmen who patrolled and guarded the streets of a town before the introduction of the police force. <i>The security forces have been keeping a close watch on our activities.</i> |
