## Peer as a Noun

### Definitions of "Peer" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “peer” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A nobleman (duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron) who is a member of the British peerage.*
- *A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.*



### Synonyms of "Peer" as a noun (3 Words)

- compeer** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.  
*He had **compeers** in Fleet Street.*
- equal** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.  
*Entertainment facilities without **equal** in the British Isles.*
- match** The score needed to win a match.  
*If you drop a **match** in there the whole place will explode.*



## Peer as a Verb

### Definitions of "Peer" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "peer" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Come into view; appear.*
- *Look searchingly.*
- *Look with difficulty or concentration at someone or something.*
- *Be just visible.*





### Synonyms of "Peer" as a verb (7 Words)

<b>look closely</b>	Take charge of or deal with.
<b>look earnestly</b>	Take charge of or deal with.
<b>look through narrowed eyes</b>	Convey by one's expression.
<b>narrow one's eyes</b>	Make or become more narrow or restricted.
<b>screw up one's eyes</b>	Cause to penetrate, as with a circular motion.
<b>squint</b>	Be cross eyed have a squint or strabismus. <i>The driver <b>squinted</b> as the sun hit his windshield.</i>
<b>try to see</b>	Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.



## Usage Examples of "Peer" as a verb

- *For yet a many of your horsemen peer.*
- *Faye peered at her with suspicion.*
- *The towers peer over the roofs.*
- *We peered into the back of the shop to see whether a salesman was around.*



## Associations of "Peer" (30 Words)

<b>academic</b>	Relating to an educational or scholarly institution or environment. <i>Ben is not an <b>academic</b> child but he tries hard.</i>
<b>accompany</b>	Go or travel along with. <i>The two sisters were to <b>accompany</b> us to London.</i>
<b>acquaintance</b>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>The pupils had little <b>acquaintance</b> with the language.</i>
<b>affinity</b>	Relationship, especially by marriage as opposed to blood ties. <i>A semantic <b>affinity</b> between two words.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A boyfriend or male admirer.
<b>brother</b>	A man or boy in relation to other sons and daughters of his parents. <i>There I was with one white boy and this other <b>brother</b>.</i>
<b>buddy</b>	Become friendly and spend time with someone. <i>I m working on it <b>buddy</b>.</i>



<b><u>camaraderie</u></b>	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>His travelling <b>companion</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	The state of being with someone. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b><u>comrade</u></b>	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>You re right <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The company and friendship of others with common aims. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b><u>consort</u></b>	A ship sailing in company with another. <i>It did not <b>consort</b> with his idea of scientific government.</i>
<b>countryman</b>	A man from your own country. <i>He was a complete <b>countryman</b> with a pronounced affinity with nature.</i>
<b><u>crony</u></b>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	Sharing a particular activity, quality, or condition with someone or something. <i>One eye was blue but its <b>fellow</b> was brown.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Relating to folk music. <i>An old <b>folks</b> home.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He was my best <b>friend</b> at the university.</i>
<b>kinship</b>	Blood relationship. <i>Anthropology s <b>kinship</b> with the humanities.</i>
<b>matching</b>	Being two identical. <i>A blue jacket and <b>matching</b> skirt.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>It was his first start against his former <b>teammates</b>.</i>

<b>neighbour</b>	A person who lives (or is located) near another. <i>The square <b>neighbours</b> the old quarter of the town.</i>
<b><u>pair</u></b>	Put together or join to form a pair. <i>The two old friends <b>paired</b> off.</i>
<b><u>pal</u></b>	A friend. <i>We've been <b>pals</b> for a long time.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	Act as a partner. <i>Young farmers who <b>partnered</b> Isabel to the village dance.</i>
<b><u>reunion</u></b>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>The <b>reunion</b> of East and West Germany.</i>
<b><u>spouse</u></b>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>workmate</b>	A person with whom one works.
