### **Definitions of "Peers" as a noun**

- *A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.*
- *A nobleman (duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron) who is a member of the British peerage.*

- compeer** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.  
*He had **compeers** in Fleet Street.*
- equal** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.  
*Entertainment facilities without **equal** in the British Isles.*
- match** The score needed to win a match.  
*Stones of a perfect **match** and colour.*



## Associations of "Peers" (30 Words)

<b>academic</b>	Marked by a narrow focus on or display of learning especially its trivial aspects. <i>Ben is not an <b>academic</b> child but he tries hard.</i>
<b>accompany</b>	Be present or occur at the same time as (something else). <i>He would play his violin and Mother used to <b>accompany</b> him on our organ.</i>
<u><a href="#">acquaintance</a></u>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I renewed my <b>acquaintance</b> with Herbert.</i>
<u><a href="#">affinity</a></u>	Kinship by marriage or adoption; not a blood relationship. <i>The distinction between kinship and <b>affinity</b> is not always clear cut.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A boyfriend or male admirer.
<u><a href="#">brother</a></u>	A male with the same parents as someone else. <i>None of his <b>brothers</b> would betray him.</i>



<b>buddy</b>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I decided to <b>buddy</b> up to them.</i>
<b>camaraderie</b>	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b>companion</b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>Fear became my constant <b>companion</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b>comrade</b>	A fellow member of the Communist Party. <i>Hewett turned and rushed to help his <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b>consort</b>	Keep company. <i>Queen Victoria and her <b>consort</b> Prince Albert.</i>
<b>countryman</b>	A man from your own country. <i>They trust a fellow <b>countryman</b>.</i>
<b>crony</b>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<b>fellow</b>	A boy or man. <i>One eye was blue but its <b>fellow</b> was brown.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Relating to folk music. <i>A <b>folk</b> museum.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Befriend someone. <i>I am <b>friend</b>ed by 29 people who I have not <b>friend</b>ed back.</i>
<b>kinship</b>	A sharing of characteristics or origins. <i>They felt a <b>kinship</b> with architects.</i>
<b>matching</b>	Corresponding in pattern, colour, or design; complementary. <i>The college will provide <b>matching</b> funds to complete the project.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Successful males may <b>mate</b> with many females.</i>

<b>neighbour</b>	A person living next door to or very near to the speaker or person referred to. <i>I chatted with my <b>neighbour</b> on the flight to New York.</i>
<u><b>pair</b></u>	Form a pair or pairs. <i>A <b>pair</b> of gloves.</i>
<u><b>pal</b></u>	Spend time with a friend. <i>Back off <b>pal</b>.</i>
<u><b>partner</b></u>	A person's partner in marriage. <i>The striker looked sharp and eager as Jackson's <b>partner</b> in attack.</i>
<u><b>reunion</b></u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>The <b>reunion</b> of East and West Germany.</i>
<u><b>spouse</b></u>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>workmate</b>	A fellow worker.
