Definitions of "Peers" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “peers” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.*
- *A nobleman (duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron) who is a member of the British peerage.*



Synonyms of "Peers" as a noun (3 Words)

- compeer** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.
*He had **compeers** in Fleet Street.*
- equal** A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.
*Entertainment facilities without **equal** in the British Isles.*
- match** The score needed to win a match.
*Stones of a perfect **match** and colour.*

academic	Marked by a narrow focus on or display of learning especially its trivial aspects. <i>Ben is not an academic child but he tries hard.</i>
accompany	Be present or occur at the same time as (something else). <i>He would play his violin and Mother used to accompany him on our organ.</i>
<u>acquaintance</u>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I renewed my acquaintance with Herbert.</i>
<u>affinity</u>	Kinship by marriage or adoption; not a blood relationship. <i>The distinction between kinship and affinity is not always clear cut.</i>
beau	A boyfriend or male admirer.
<u>brother</u>	A male with the same parents as someone else. <i>None of his brothers would betray him.</i>

buddy	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I decided to buddy up to them.</i>
camaraderie	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced camaraderie of office life.</i>
colleague	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
companion	Be a companion to somebody. <i>Fear became my constant companion.</i>
companionship	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and companionship of marriage.</i>
compatriot	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his compatriot Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
comrade	A fellow member of the Communist Party. <i>Hewett turned and rushed to help his comrade.</i>
comradeship	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from comradeship with others in the team.</i>
consort	Keep company. <i>Queen Victoria and her consort Prince Albert.</i>
countryman	A man from your own country. <i>They trust a fellow countryman.</i>
crony	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
fellow	A boy or man. <i>One eye was blue but its fellow was brown.</i>
folk	Relating to folk music. <i>A folk museum.</i>
friend	Befriend someone. <i>I am friended by 29 people who I have not friended back.</i>
kinship	A sharing of characteristics or origins. <i>They felt a kinship with architects.</i>
matching	Corresponding in pattern, colour, or design; complementary. <i>The college will provide matching funds to complete the project.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Successful males may mate with many females.</i>

neighbour	A person living next door to or very near to the speaker or person referred to. <i>I chatted with my neighbour on the flight to New York.</i>
<u>pair</u>	Form a pair or pairs. <i>A pair of gloves.</i>
<u>pal</u>	Spend time with a friend. <i>Back off pal.</i>
<u>partner</u>	A person's partner in marriage. <i>The striker looked sharp and eager as Jackson's partner in attack.</i>
<u>reunion</u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>The reunion of East and West Germany.</i>
<u>spouse</u>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
workmate	A fellow worker.
