<b>penalisation</b>	The act of punishing.
<b>penalization</b>	The act of punishing.
<b>penance</b>	Voluntary self-punishment in order to atone for some wrongdoing. <i>He had done public <b>penance</b> for those hasty words.</i>
<b>punishment</b>	A penalty inflicted as retribution for an offence. <i>She assisted her husband to escape <b>punishment</b> for the crime.</i>
<b>retribution</b>	Punishment inflicted on someone as vengeance for a wrong or criminal act. <i>Divine <b>retribution</b>.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Measures taken by a state to coerce another to conform to an international agreement or norms of conduct, typically in the form of restrictions on trade or official sporting participation. <i>The United States had agreed to lift economic <b>sanctions</b>.</i>
<b>snag</b>	A rent or tear in fabric caused by a snag. <i>Dozens of species of birds and mammals use standing <b>snags</b> for nesting.</i>

### **abeyance**

Temporary cessation or suspension.

*Matters were held in **abeyance** pending further enquiries.*

<b>accuse</b>	Claim that (someone) has done something wrong. <i>He was <b>accused</b> of murdering his wife's lover.</i>
<b><u>berate</u></b>	Scold or criticize (someone) angrily. <i>She <b>berated</b> herself for being fickle.</i>
<b>castigate</b>	Inflict severe punishment on. <i>He was <b>castigated</b> for not setting a good example.</i>
<b>castigation</b>	A severe scolding.
<b>chasten</b>	Censure severely. <i>The director was somewhat <b>chastened</b> by his recent flops.</i>
<b><u>chastise</u></b>	Censure severely. <i>He <b>chastised</b> his colleagues for their laziness.</i>
<b>comeuppance</b>	An outcome (good or bad) that is well deserved and fitting. <i>He got his <b>comeuppance</b> in the end.</i>
<b>demotion</b>	Act of lowering in rank or position. <i>She could remain on the staff if she accepted <b>demotion</b> to ordinary lecturer.</i>
<b>disciplinary</b>	Concerning or enforcing discipline. <i>A soldier will face <b>disciplinary</b> action after going absent without leave.</i>
<b><u>errant</u></b>	Travelling in search of adventure. <i>That same lady <b>errant</b>.</i>
<b>felony</b>	A crime regarded in the US and many other judicial systems as more serious than a misdemeanour. <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>gibbet</b>	Hang up a body on a gibbet. <i>Poor Melbourne is <b>gibbeted</b> in The Times.</i>
<b>misbehavior</b>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior.
<b><u>misdeed</u></b>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>His past <b>misdeeds</b> were forgiven.</i>
<b>penal</b>	(of an act or offence) punishable by law. <i>The campaign for <b>penal</b> reform.</i>
<b>penalize</b>	Impose a penalty on; inflict punishment on. <i>Section twenty <b>penalizes</b> possession of a firearm when trespassing.</i>
<b>punish</b>	Impose a penalty on; inflict punishment on. <i>I have done wrong and I'm being <b>punished</b> for it.</i>
<b><u>punitive</u></b>	Inflicting or intended as punishment. <i>A current <b>punitive</b> interest rate of 31.3 per cent.</i>

<b>rebuke</b>	An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>The judge publicly <b>rebuked</b> the jury.</i>
<b>reprimand</b>	Address a reprimand to. <i>Officials were <b>reprimanded</b> for poor work.</i>
<b>reproof</b>	Censure severely or angrily. <i>She welcomed him with a mild <b>reproof</b> for leaving her alone.</i>
<b>retribution</b>	The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next life. <i>Minos threatened war against Athens in <b>retribution</b> for his son's death.</i>
<b>retributive</b>	Given or inflicted in requital according to merits or deserts. <i><b>Retributive</b> justice.</i>
<b>scold</b>	Someone (especially a woman) who annoys people by constantly finding fault. <i>His mother was the village <b>scold</b>.</i>
<b>spank</b>	Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>She was <b>spanked</b> for spilling ink on the carpet.</i>
<b>subdue</b>	Bring under control by force or authority. <i>Charles went on a campaign to <b>subdue</b> the Saxons.</i>
<b>suspension</b>	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>Modifications have been made to the car's rear <b>suspension</b>.</i>
<b>vindictory</b>	Given or inflicted in requital according to merits or deserts.
<b>violator</b>	Someone who assaults others sexually. <i>Monica is able to name the <b>violators</b> of her body.</i>
