pick out	Remove unwanted substances from, such as feathers or pits.
rate	Consider to be of a certain quality or standard. <i>The average life of the new bulb is rated at approximately 500 hours.</i>
realize	Convert (an asset) into cash. <i>The item can be realized with a fully low front vowel.</i>
recognize	(of a computer or other machine) automatically identify and respond correctly to (a sound, printed character, etc). <i>He was recognized as an international authority.</i>
regard	(of a thing) relate to; concern. <i>She regarded London as her base.</i>
