Definitions of "Perennial" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "perennial" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- (of a stream or spring) flowing throughout the year.
- Apparently permanently engaged in a specified role or way of life.
- Lasting an indefinitely long time; suggesting self-renewal.
- Lasting three seasons or more.
- Recurring again and again.
- Lasting or existing for a long or apparently infinite time; enduring or continually recurring.
- (of a plant) living for several years.

<u>ceaseless</u>	Constant and unending. The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.
constant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. In constant pain.

CONTINUINA	Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. A <i>continuing controversy.</i>
endless	Having no known beginning and presumably no end. <i>Time is endless.</i>
<u>enduring</u>	Unceasing. He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.
<u>eternal</u>	(of truths, values, or questions) valid for all time; essentially unchanging. To his eternal credit he maintained his dignity throughout.
everiacting	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. An everlasting reminder of this evening.
lasting	Lasting a long time without change. They left a lasting impression.
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
<u>permanent</u>	Continuing or enduring without marked change in status or condition or place. <i>He s in a permanent state of rage.</i>
nernemai	Never ending or changing. He grows perpetual flowering carnations.
persisting	Relentless and indefatigable in pursuit or as if in pursuit.
<u>recurrent</u>	Recurring again and again. She had a recurrent dream about falling.
repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. There were repeated attempts to negotiate.
<u>unchanging</u>	Not changing; remaining the same. The party stood for unchanging principles.
undying	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. Promises of undying love.
<u>unending</u>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. The unending bliss of heaven.
<u>unfailing</u>	Always able to supply more. Unfailing loyalty.

<u>frequent</u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. Pubs frequent ed by soldiers.
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. The incessant beat of the music.
<u>occasionally</u>	Now and then or here and there. We met up occasionally for a drink.
oft	Many times at short intervals. An oft quoted tenet.
perennially	In a perennial manner; repeatedly. Perennially popular destinations like Rome.
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.
periodical	A publication that appears at fixed intervals. Britain s best periodical art magazine.
periodically	From time to time; occasionally. The lamps were periodically switched on and off at 30 minute intervals.
