Definitions of "Perennial" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “perennial” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a stream or spring) flowing throughout the year.*
- *Apparently permanently engaged in a specified role or way of life.*
- *Lasting an indefinitely long time; suggesting self-renewal.*
- *Lasting three seasons or more.*
- *Recurring again and again.*
- *Lasting or existing for a long or apparently infinite time; enduring or continually recurring.*
- *(of a plant) living for several years.*



Synonyms of "Perennial" as an adjective (20 Words)

- abiding** Unceasing.
*He had an **abiding** respect for her.*
- ceaseless** Constant and unending.
*The fort was subjected to **ceaseless** bombardment.*
- constant** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
*In **constant** pain.*

<u>continual</u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>The continual banging of the shutters.</i>
continuing	Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. <i>A continuing controversy.</i>
endless	Having no known beginning and presumably no end. <i>Time is endless.</i>
<u>enduring</u>	Unceasing. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i>
<u>eternal</u>	(of truths, values, or questions) valid for all time; essentially unchanging. <i>To his eternal credit he maintained his dignity throughout.</i>
everlasting	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>An everlasting reminder of this evening.</i>
<u>lasting</u>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>They left a lasting impression.</i>
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
<u>permanent</u>	Continuing or enduring without marked change in status or condition or place. <i>He s in a permanent state of rage.</i>
perpetual	Never ending or changing. <i>He grows perpetual flowering carnations.</i>
persisting	Relentless and indefatigable in pursuit or as if in pursuit.
<u>recurrent</u>	Recurring again and again. <i>She had a recurrent dream about falling.</i>
repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
<u>undying</u>	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. <i>Promises of undying love.</i>
<u>unending</u>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The unending bliss of heaven.</i>
<u>unfailing</u>	Always able to supply more. <i>Unfailing loyalty.</i>

- almanac** A handbook, typically published annually, containing information of general interest or on a sport or pastime.
- annual** An annual plant.
*An **annual** trip to Paris.*
- annually** Once a year; every year.
*Sales are increasing by about 17 **annually**.*
- biannual** Occurring or payable twice each year.
*The **biannual** meeting of the planning committee.*

biennial	A biennial plant. <i>Parsnips and carrots are biennial plants often grown as annuals.</i>
ceaseless	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.</i>
constant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The condition of struggle remained a constant.</i>
continual	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Continual is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i>
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>A continuous row of warehouses.</i>
daily	Relating to the period of a single day. <i>The museum is open daily.</i>
every	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every party is welcome.</i>
frequent	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Pubs frequented by soldiers.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
occasionally	Now and then or here and there. <i>We met up occasionally for a drink.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i>
perennially	In a perennial manner; repeatedly. <i>Perennially popular destinations like Rome.</i>
periodic	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
periodical	A publication that appears at fixed intervals. <i>Britain s best periodical art magazine.</i>
periodically	From time to time; occasionally. <i>The lamps were periodically switched on and off at 30 minute intervals.</i>
recurrence	Happening again (especially at regular intervals). <i>A drug used to prevent the recurrence of breast cancer.</i>
recurrent	Recurring again and again. <i>She had a recurrent dream about falling.</i>

<u>recurring</u>	(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
regular	A regular member of the armed forces. <i>A regular morass of details.</i>
regularity	The state or quality of being regular. <i>He was famous for the regularity of his habits.</i>
<u>regularly</u>	In a regular manner. <i>Make a point of regularly consulting the noticeboard.</i>
repeated	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i>
triennial	A visitation of an Anglican diocese by its bishop every three years. <i>The triennial meeting of the Association.</i>
<u>weekly</u>	Without missing a week. <i>Weekly paper.</i>
<u>yearly</u>	Once a year or every year. <i>Rent was paid yearly.</i>
