<b>paragon</b>	A person or thing viewed as a model of excellence. <i>Your cook is a <b>paragon</b>.</i>
<b>perfecting</b>	A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed (sometimes regarded as perfective aspect).
<b>polishing</b>	A preparation used in polishing. <i>Every Sunday he gave his car a good <b>polishing</b>.</i>
<b>refinement</b>	The improvement or clarification of something by the making of small changes. <i>Her carefully cultivated veneer of <b>refinement</b>.</i>
<b>refining</b>	The process of removing impurities (as from oil or metals or sugar etc).
<b>sublimity</b>	Nobility in thought or feeling or style.
