a nonpareil	Model of excellence or perfection of a kind; one having no equal.
a paragon	An ideal instance; a perfect embodiment of a concept.
amelioration	The act of making something better; improvement. <i>Progress brings with it the amelioration of the human condition.</i>
beau ideal	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman.
betterment	An improvement that adds to the value of a property or facility. <i>They believed that what they were doing was vital for the betterment of society.</i>
excellence	The quality of excelling; possessing good qualities in high degree. <i>Awards for excellence.</i>
exquisiteness	Extreme beauty of a delicate sort.
faultlessness	The quality of being without an error or fault.

flawlessness	The state of being without a flaw or defect.
<u>idol</u>	A material effigy that is worshipped. <i>A soccer idol.</i>
immaculateness	The state of being spotlessly clean.
impeccability	The quality of being exempt from sin or incapable of sinning.
improvement	A change for the better; progress in development. <i>Home improvements.</i>
magnificence	The quality of being magnificent or splendid or grand. <i>The magnificence of the surrounding countryside.</i>
ne plus ultra	A useful or valuable quality.
<u>paragon</u>	A person or thing viewed as a model of excellence. <i>Your cook is a paragon.</i>
perfecting	A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed (sometimes regarded as perfective aspect).
polishing	A preparation used in polishing. <i>Every Sunday he gave his car a good polishing.</i>
<u>refinement</u>	The improvement or clarification of something by the making of small changes. <i>Her carefully cultivated veneer of refinement.</i>
refining	The process of removing impurities (as from oil or metals or sugar etc).
sublimity	Nobility in thought or feeling or style.
the beau idéal	A man who is much concerned with his dress and appearance.
the ideal	Model of excellence or perfection of a kind; one having no equal.
the last word	Holding device shaped like a human foot that is used to fashion or repair shoes.
the ne plus ultra	The arithmetic operation of summing; calculating the sum of two or more numbers.
the ultimate	The finest or most superior quality of its kind.

beauty	Good; excellent (used as a general term of approval). <i>The artistry and beauty of football.</i>
best	To the highest degree; most (used with verbs suggesting a desirable action or state or a successful outcome). <i>The best dressed man in Britain.</i>
blameless	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>Has lived a blameless life.</i>
<u>chaste</u>	Morally pure (especially not having experienced sexual intercourse). <i>Chaste Classical symmetry.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
excellence	An outstanding feature or quality. <i>A centre of academic excellence.</i>
<u>exemplify</u>	Be characteristic of. <i>The best dry sherry is exemplified by the fino of Jerez.</i>
<u>flawless</u>	Without a flaw. <i>Her smooth flawless skin.</i>
good	In a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>Good manners.</i>
ideal	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>You re my ideal of how a man should be.</i>
<u>immaculate</u>	Uniformly coloured without spots or other marks. <i>Timing and technique were immaculate.</i>
impeccable	Not capable of sin. <i>Speaks impeccable French.</i>
innocent	Lacking intent or capacity to injure. <i>Innocent of literary merit.</i>

nonesuch	A small Eurasian medick which is widely grown as a constituent of grazing pasture.
nonpareil	An old type size equal to six points (larger than ruby). <i>The team s nonpareil center fielder.</i>
optimal	Most desirable possible under a restriction expressed or implied. Optimal concentration of a drug.
paragon	A person or thing viewed as a model of excellence. <i>Your cook is a paragon.</i>
perfect	Make perfect or complete. Perfect happiness.
pristine	Clean and fresh as if new; spotless. <i>Handed her his pristine white handkerchief.</i>
pure	Being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>The jacket was pure wool.</i>
saint	Declare a dead person to be a saint. <i>She s a saint to go on living with that man.</i>
sinless	Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i>
spotless	Without faults or moral blemishes; pure. Spotless behaviour is seemingly the norm in his organization.
unaffected	Emotionally unmoved. <i>Entirely unaffected by each other s writings.</i>
unblemished	Free from physical or moral spots or stains. <i>An unblemished complexion.</i>
unstained	Without soil or spot or stain. <i>His unstained jeans.</i>
unsullied	(of reputation) free from blemishes. <i>The unsullied snow of mountains.</i>
virtuous	Chaste (typically used of a woman). <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
