Definitions of "Perfunctory" as an adjective

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "perfunctory" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough.
- As a formality only.
- (of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort.
- Done or produced as a formality only.
