- *Not capable of being reversed or returned to the original condition.*
- *Lasting or continuing without interruption.*
- *Continuing or enduring without marked change in status or condition or place.*

everlasting	Lasting forever or a very long time. <i>An everlasting reminder of this evening.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>He was unable to establish the shop on a firm financial footing.</i>
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>A fixed iron ladder down the port side.</i>
immutable	Not subject or susceptible to change or variation in form or quality or nature. <i>The view of that time was that all species were immutable created by God.</i>
imperishable	Lasting a long time. <i>Imperishable truths.</i>
indefinite	Vague or not clearly defined or stated. <i>Must you be so indefinite.</i>
indelible	Not able to be forgotten. <i>An indelible marker pen.</i>
indestructible	Very long lasting. <i>Indestructible plastic containers.</i>
indissoluble	Used of decisions and contracts. <i>An indissoluble friendship.</i>
ineradicable	Not able to be destroyed or rooted out. <i>Ineradicable superstitions.</i>
invariable	Not liable to or capable of change. <i>His routine was invariable.</i>
irreparable	Impossible to repair, rectify, or amend. <i>They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.</i>
irreversible	Incapable of being reversed. <i>She suffered irreversible damage to her health.</i>

lasting	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A lasting relationship.</i>
lifelong	Continuing through life. <i>From lifelong habit.</i>
long-lasting	Existing for a long time.
long-term	Relating to or extending over a relatively long time.
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
perennial	(of a stream or spring) flowing throughout the year. <i>Perennial manifestations of urban crisis.</i>
perpetual	Never ending or changing. <i>A perpetual secretary of the society.</i>
persistent	Retained; not shed. <i>Persistent rain will affect many areas.</i>
secure	(of a place of detention) having provisions against the escape of inmates. <i>No airport is totally secure.</i>
solid	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A solid voting bloc.</i>
sound	In excellent physical condition. <i>A sound economy.</i>
stable	(of an object or structure) not likely to give way or overturn; firmly fixed. <i>The officer concerned is mentally and emotionally stable.</i>
standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>A standing lamp.</i>
unalterable	Remaining the same for indefinitely long times. <i>Unalterable resolve.</i>
unchangeable	Not liable to variation or able to be altered. <i>One of the unchangeable facts of life.</i>
unchanging	Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
undying	Never dying. <i>His undying fame.</i>
unending	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The charity rescues children from unending poverty.</i>

interminable	Endless or apparently endless (often used hyperbolically). <i>An interminable sermon.</i>
permanence	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
perpetual	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Their perpetual money worries.</i>
<u>perpetuity</u>	A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>

unlimited	Having no limits in range or scope. <i>To start with a theory of unlimited freedom is to end up with unlimited despotism.</i>
<u>unremitting</u>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Unremitting demands of hunger.</i>
