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Associations of "Perpetuates" (30 Words)

ceaseless	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.</i>
changeless	Not subject or susceptible to change or variation in form or quality or nature. <i>Changeless truths.</i>
constant	A quantity that does not vary. <i>A man constant in adherence to his ideals.</i>
continuation	A part that is attached to and is an extension of something else. <i>The government's continuation in office.</i>
endless	Having or seeming to have no end or limit. <i>Time is endless.</i>
epitomize	Be a perfect example of. <i>The company epitomized the problems faced by British industry.</i>
eternal	Used to refer to an everlasting or universal spirit, as represented by God. <i>The wait seemed eternal.</i>
everlasting	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Life everlasting.</i>
extend	Extend in scope or range or area. <i>Extend my greetings.</i>
extension	A room or rooms added to an existing building. <i>Nature for Descartes was pure extension in space.</i>
forever	Without interruption. <i>Parenting is a forever job.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
indelible	Not able to be forgotten. <i>An indelible marker pen.</i>

inequality	Lack of smoothness or regularity in a surface. <i>Social inequality.</i>
intension	Resolution or determination.
interminable	Endless or apparently endless (often used hyperbolically). <i>An interminable sermon.</i>
long	Of elongated shape. <i>An hour long.</i>
memory	The area of cognitive psychology that studies memory processes. <i>The module provides 16Mb of memory.</i>
permanent	Lasting or intended to last or remain unchanged indefinitely. <i>A woman with a home permanent.</i>
perpetual	(of a plant) blooming or fruiting several times in one season. <i>He grows perpetual flowering carnations.</i>
perpetually	Without interruption. <i>She seems perpetually to have a mournful look on her face.</i>
perpetuation	The act of prolonging something. <i>We criticized the perpetuation of racial stereotypes.</i>
perpetuity	The property of being perpetual (seemingly ceaseless). <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>
poverty	The state of being extremely poor. <i>Thousands of families are living in abject poverty.</i>
preservation	The action of preserving something. <i>The preservation of the city's green spaces.</i>
prolongation	Extension of the spatial length of something. <i>An agreement on further prolongation of the boundary proved difficult.</i>
reminder	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>One man was threatened with court action for not paying his water rates when he did not receive a reminder.</i>
stereotype	View or represent as a stereotype. <i>I was stereotyped as a lazy Southern European.</i>
timeless	Unaffected by time. <i>Helen's timeless beauty.</i>
unceasing	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
