### **Definitions of "Persevering" as an adjective**

<b>acceptance</b>	Words signifying consent to the terms of an offer (thereby creating a contract. <i>He anticipated their <b>acceptance</b> of his offer.</i>
<b>bear</b>	Be pregnant with. <i>She could hardly <b>bear</b> his sarcasm.</i>
<b>bearable</b>	Able to be endured. <i>Things to make life in the tropics more <b>bearable</b>.</i>
<b>catholicity</b>	The quality of being universal; existing everywhere.
<b>endurable</b>	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i>My journey was long but <b>endurable</b>.</i>
<b>endurance</b>	Denoting or relating to a race or other sporting event that takes place over a long distance or otherwise demands great physical stamina. <i>The marathon tests a runner's <b>endurance</b>.</i>

<b>endure</b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>These cities have <b>endured</b> through time.</i>
<b>forbear</b>	Politely or patiently restrain an impulse to do something; refrain. <i>She could not <b>forbear</b> weeping.</i>
<b>forbearance</b>	A delay in enforcing rights or claims or privileges; refraining from acting. <i>His unfailing courtesy and <b>forbearance</b> under great provocation.</i>
<b>forbearing</b>	Showing patient and unruffled self-control and restraint under adversity; slow to retaliate or express resentment. <i>Seemly and <b>forbearing</b> yet strong enough to resist aggression.</i>
<b>fortitude</b>	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b>.</i>
<b>generous</b>	More than is usual or necessary. <i>A <b>generous</b> assessment of his work.</i>
<b>largesse</b>	Money or gifts given generously. <i>Presumably public money is not dispensed with such <b>largesse</b> to anyone else.</i>
<b>leeway</b>	The amount of freedom to move or act that is available. <i>There is little <b>leeway</b> if anything goes wrong.</i>
<b>leniency</b>	A disposition to yield to the wishes of someone. <i>The court could show <b>leniency</b>.</i>
<b>magnanimity</b>	The fact or condition of being magnanimous; generosity. <i>Both sides will have to show <b>magnanimity</b>.</i>
<b>munificence</b>	The quality or action of being extremely generous. <i>We must be thankful for his <b>munificence</b>.</i>
<b>patience</b>	A card game played by one person. <i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>
<b>patient</b>	A person receiving or registered to receive medical treatment. <i>A <b>patient</b> and painstaking approach.</i>
<b>permissible</b>	Permitted; allowed. <i><b>Permissible</b> behavior in school.</i>
<b>perseverance</b>	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>His <b>perseverance</b> with the technique illustrates his single mindedness.</i>
<b>persistence</b>	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>The <b>persistence</b> of huge environmental problems.</i>
<b>sufferance</b>	Patient endurance especially of pain or distress. <i>Charles was only here on <b>sufferance</b>.</i>



<b><u>temperance</u></b>	The trait of avoiding excesses. <i>The <b>temperance</b> movement.</i>
<b><u>tolerable</u></b>	Able to be endured. <i>He was fond of music and had a <b>tolerable</b> voice.</i>
<b>tolerance</b>	An allowable amount of variation of a specified quantity, especially in the dimensions of a machine or part. <i>An advocate of religious <b>tolerance</b>.</i>
<b><u>tolerant</u></b>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>A more <b>tolerant</b> attitude towards other religions.</i>
<b><u>tolerate</u></b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>How was it that she could <b>tolerate</b> such noise.</i>
<b>toleration</b>	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>The king demanded greater religious <b>toleration</b>.</i>
<b><u>undergo</u></b>	Experience or be subjected to (something, typically something unpleasant or arduous). <i>The chemical <b>undergoes</b> a sudden change.</i>
