follow something through	Imitate in behavior; take as a model.
go on	Lead, extend, or afford access.
hang in	Suspend (meat) in order to get a gamey taste.
hang on	Suspend (meat) in order to get a gamey taste.

hold	Have or hold in one's hands or grip. <i>This theory still holds.</i>
hold on	Hold the attention of.

not take no for an answer	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.
persevere	Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
plod on	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud.
plough on	Continue moving forward.
press ahead	Press and smooth with a heated iron.
press on	Place between two surfaces and apply weight or pressure.
prevail	Prove more powerful or superior. <i>A friendly atmosphere prevailed among the crowds.</i>
remain	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>The dress remained wet after repeated attempts to dry it.</i>
run	Be operating running or functioning. <i>Andrea runs her own catering business.</i>
see something through	Deem to be.
show determination	Make visible or noticeable.
stay	Stay behind. <i>Stay alone.</i>
stay with something	Stop a judicial process.
survive	Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal). <i>He has survived several assassination attempts.</i>



Usage Examples of "Persist" as a verb

- *The minority of drivers who persist in drinking.*
- *He persisted to call me every night.*
- *If the symptoms persist for more than a few days, then contact your doctor.*
- *We are persisting with policies that will create jobs for the future.*
- *The child persisted and kept asking questions.*

- continuity** The property of a continuous and connected period of time.
*A consensus favouring **continuity** of policy.*
- endurance** Denoting or relating to a race or other sporting event that takes place over a long distance or otherwise demands great physical stamina.
*She was close to the limit of her **endurance**.*
- endure** Continue to live and avoid dying.
*The legend of Elvis **endures**.*

forbear	Politely or patiently restrain an impulse to do something; refrain. <i>She could not forbear weeping.</i>
lag	Cover with lagging to prevent heat loss. <i>Lag pipes.</i>
linger	Spend a long time over (something). <i>She lingered in the yard enjoying the warm sunshine.</i>
onwards	In a forward direction.
patience	Good-natured tolerance of delay or incompetence. <i>You can find bargains if you have the patience to sift through the rubbish.</i>
patiently	In a way that shows tolerance of delays, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. <i>He patiently explained the pros and cons.</i>
persevere	Be persistent, refuse to stop. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
persistence	The property of a continuous and connected period of time. <i>Cardiff's persistence was rewarded with a try.</i>
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
remain	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>He remained unmoved by her tears.</i>
reside	Make one's home in a particular place or community. <i>The paintings now reside on the walls of a restaurant.</i>
sojourn	Spend a certain length of time; reside temporarily. <i>Her sojourn in Rome.</i>
stay	Stay put in a certain place. <i>Some men are always great at beginnings but they have no stay in them.</i>
still	A plant and works where alcoholic drinks are made by distillation. <i>A still autumn day.</i>
survive	Continue to live and avoid dying. <i>She had to work day and night and survive on two hours sleep.</i>
tarry	Leave slowly and hesitantly. <i>A length of tarry rope.</i>
tenacity	Persistent determination. <i>The tenacity of certain myths within the historical record.</i>

timeless Not affected by the passage of time or changes in fashion.
*Helen s **timeless** beauty.*

toleration The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour.
*All people should practice **toleration** and live together in peace.*

unaltered Remaining the same; unchanged.
*Persisting **unaltered** through time.*

undaunted Resolutely courageous.
*They were **undaunted** by the huge amount of work needed.*

wait Time during which some action is awaited.
*I can t **wait** to tell Nick what happened.*

withstand Remain undamaged or unaffected by; resist.
*The new material **withstands** even the greatest wear and tear.*
