## Persists as a Verb

### Definitions of "Persists" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “persists” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Stay behind.*
- *Be persistent, refuse to stop.*
- *Continue to exist.*



## Synonyms of "Persists" as a verb (10 Words)

- die hard** To be on base at the end of an inning, of a player.
- endure** Suffer (something painful or difficult) patiently.  
*It seemed impossible that anyone could **endure** such pain.*
- hang in** Suspend (meat) in order to get a gamey taste.
- hang on** Decorate or furnish with something suspended.
- hold on** Organize or be responsible for.
- persevere** Be persistent, refuse to stop.  
*His family **persevered** with his treatment.*
- prevail** Be widespread or current in a particular area or at a particular time.  
*She was **prevailed** upon to give an account of her work.*
- remain** Stay the same remain in a certain state.  
*He had **remained** alert the whole time.*

**run** Be operating running or functioning.  
**Run** *a new program on the Mac.*

**stay** Fasten with stays.  
*It did not matter to you whether the building was **stayed** up or not.*



## Usage Examples of "Persists" as a verb

- *The child persisted and kept asking questions.*
- *He persisted to call me every night.*



## Associations of "Persists" (30 Words)

- bear** Bring forth.  
*The bees form large colonies and need the thick branches of tall trees to **bear** the weight of their nests.*
- consistent** Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts.  
*The parents are being **consistent** and firm in their reactions.*

<b>continue</b>	Continue after an interruption. <i>She <b>continued</b> as deputy mayor for another year.</i>
<b>continuity</b>	A connection or line of development with no sharp breaks. <i>They have provided the country with a measure of <b>continuity</b>.</i>
<b>endurance</b>	The ability to endure an unpleasant or difficult process or situation without giving way. <i>She was close to the limit of her <b>endurance</b>.</i>
<b>endure</b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>The legend of Elvis <b>endures</b>.</i>
<b>flophouse</b>	A cheap lodging house. <i>They are living in a <b>flophouse</b> and discovering that the streets are not paved with gold.</i>
<b>forbear</b>	A person from whom you are descended. <i>She could not <b>forbear</b> weeping.</i>
<b>lag</b>	Cover with lagging to prevent heat loss. <i>A time <b>lag</b> between infection and symptoms.</i>
<b>linger</b>	Spend a long time over (something). <i>Her perfume <b>lingered</b> on.</i>
<b>onwards</b>	In a forward direction.
<b>patience</b>	Any of various forms of card game for one player, the object of which is to use up all one's cards by forming particular arrangements and sequences. <i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>
<b>patiently</b>	With patience; in a patient manner. <i>The assembled hordes waited <b>patiently</b> to get in.</i>
<b>persevere</b>	Be persistent, refuse to stop. <i>His family <b>persevered</b> with his treatment.</i>
<b>persistence</b>	The continued or prolonged existence of something. <i>Cardiff's <b>persistence</b> was rewarded with a try.</i>
<b>pertinacity</b>	Persistent determination.
<b>remain</b>	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>Her husband <b>remained</b> at the flat in Regent s Park.</i>
<b>reside</b>	Be inherent or innate in. <i>She <b>resides</b> in Princeton.</i>
<b>sojourn</b>	A temporary stay (e.g., as a guest). <i>Her <b>sojourn</b> in Rome.</i>

<b>stay</b>	A period of staying somewhere in particular of living somewhere temporarily as a visitor or guest. <i>Some men are always great at beginnings but they have no <b>stay</b> in them.</i>
<b>still</b>	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>A <b>still</b> wine.</i>
<u>survive</u>	Manage to keep going in difficult circumstances. <i>He <b>survived</b> the cancer against all odds.</i>
<b>tarry</b>	Like or covered with tar. <i>A length of <b>tarry</b> rope.</i>
<u>tenacity</u>	The quality or fact of continuing to exist; persistence. <i>The sheer <b>tenacity</b> of the limpet.</i>
<u>timeless</u>	Unaffected by time. <i>Helen s <b>timeless</b> beauty.</i>
<b>toleration</b>	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>All people should practice <b>toleration</b> and live together in peace.</i>
<b>unaltered</b>	Remaining in an original state. <i>Many buildings survive <b>unaltered</b>.</i>
<b>undaunted</b>	Unshaken in purpose. <i><b>Undaunted</b> in the face of death.</i>
<b>wait</b>	Serve as a waiter or waitress in a restaurant. <i>I can t <b>wait</b> to tell Nick what happened.</i>
<u>withstand</u>	Offer strong resistance or opposition to. <i>The new material <b>withstands</b> even the greatest wear and tear.</i>
