## Persona as a Noun

### Definitions of "Persona" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “persona” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The aspect of someone's character that is presented to or perceived by others.*
- *An actor's portrayal of someone in a play.*
- *A role or character adopted by an author, actor, etc. or in a game.*
- *A personal facade that one presents to the world.*
- *(in Jungian psychology) the outer or assumed aspect of character.*
- *(Jungian psychology) a personal facade that one presents to the world.*



## Synonyms of "Persona" as a noun (15 Words)

- character** A person seen in terms of a particular aspect of character.  
*Shady **characters**.*
- exterior** (in filming) an outdoor scene.  
*The museum has a modern **exterior**.*
- facade** A showy misrepresentation intended to conceal something unpleasant.  
*Her flawless public **facade** masked private despair.*
- face** A vertical surface of a building or cliff.  
*We can often see the dark **face** of the moon by earthshine.*
- front** The part of a garment covering a person's front.  
*She put on a brave **front**.*
- guise** An external form, appearance, or manner of presentation, typically concealing the true nature of something.  
*Under the **guise** of friendship he betrayed them.*

<b>identity</b>	Exact sameness. <i>She guessed the <b>identity</b> of his lover.</i>
<b>image</b>	A person or thing that closely resembles another. <i>Although her popular <b>image</b> was contrived it served to inspire music and pageantry.</i>
<b>mask</b>	A party of guests wearing costumes and masks. <i>His face was a <b>mask</b> of rage.</i>
<b>part</b>	A melody or other constituent of harmony assigned to a particular voice or instrument in a musical work. <i>They resisted every effort on his <b>part</b>.</i>
<b>personality</b>	The complex of all the attributes-behavioral, temperamental, emotional and mental-that characterize a unique individual. <i>She had a sunny <b>personality</b> that was very engaging.</i>
<b>public face</b>	A body of people sharing some common interest.
<b>role</b>	An actor's portrayal of someone in a play. <i>Play its <b>role</b>.</i>
<b>self</b>	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. <i>To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of <b>self</b>.</i>
<b>theatrical role</b>	A performance of a play.



## Usage Examples of "Persona" as a noun

- *Chris adds that his media persona does not match reality.*
- *Persona and anima switch roles and merge in slow, smooth ways.*
- *His screen persona occasionally grates.*
- *Bowie burned through one persona after another.*
- *The real-world figure didn't quite match up to his muscle-bound, weapon-clad online persona.*
- *Her public persona has been sold to millions of women as the ideal.*

- actor** A person whose profession is acting on the stage, in films, or on television.

- aerial** Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air- Thomas Carlyle.  
***Aerial** bombardment of civilian targets.*
- assumed** Adopted in order to deceive.  
*A man living under an **assumed** name.*
- character** A characteristic especially one that assists in the identification of a species.  
*The island is full of **character**.*

<b><u>concoct</u></b>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i><b>Concoct</b> a strange mixture.</i>
<b>drama</b>	A dramatic work intended for performance by actors on a stage. <i>An afternoon of high <b>drama</b> at Wembley.</i>
<b>fancied</b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fancied</b> wrong.</i>
<b><u>fictitious</u></b>	Occurring in or invented for fiction. <i>A <b>fictitious</b> address.</i>
<b>figment</b>	A contrived or fantastic idea. <i>A <b>figment</b> of the imagination.</i>
<b>film</b>	Make a film or photograph of something. <i>She glowered at the television crew who were <b>filming</b> them.</i>
<b>histrionic</b>	Denoting a personality disorder marked by shallow volatile emotions and attention-seeking behaviour. <i>He loved the theatre and everything which savoured of <b>histrionics</b>.</i>
<b><u>imaginary</u></b>	(of a number or quantity) expressed in terms of the square root of a negative number (usually the square root of $-1$ , represented by $i$ or $j$ ). <i>A small child's <b>imaginary</b> friends.</i>
<b>imitative</b>	Marked by or given to imitation. <i>I found the film pretentious and <b>imitative</b>.</i>
<b>individuate</b>	Give individual shape or form to. <i>Language that <b>individuates</b> his memories.</i>
<b>performer</b>	An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience. <i>A circus <b>performer</b>.</i>
<b>pretended</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with <b>pretended</b> unconcern.</i>
<b><u>protagonist</u></b>	A person who backs a politician or a team etc. <i>The hard boiled <b>protagonist</b> of the movie Blade Runner.</i>
<b>role</b>	The actions and activities assigned to or required or expected of a person or group. <i>What is your <b>role</b> on the team.</i>
<b>serial</b>	Pertaining to or composed in serial technique. <i>A new three part drama <b>serial</b>.</i>
<b><u>sham</u></b>	Pretend to be or to be experiencing. <i>George abhorred <b>sham</b> and affectation.</i>
<b><u>streak</u></b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>She could see white <b>streaks</b> in his beard.</i>

<b>television</b>	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen. <i>The days before <b>television</b>.</i>
<b>tendency</b>	A group within a larger political party or movement. <i>Fabric with a <b>tendency</b> to shrink.</i>
<b>theatrical</b>	Relating to acting, actors, or the theatre. <i>A boarding house that catered for <b>theatricals</b>.</i>
<b>traitorous</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b>tv</b>	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen. <i>The British call a <b>tv</b> set a telly.</i>
<b>type</b>	Write by means of a keyboard with types. <i>The kidney was <b>typed</b>.</i>
<b>unsubstantial</b>	Lacking material form or substance; unreal. <i>A pretty if <b>unsubstantial</b> cubist composition.</i>
<b>video</b>	Computer science the appearance of text and graphics on a video display. <i>They sat down to watch a <b>video</b>.</i>
