Persona as a Noun

Definitions of "Persona" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “persona” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The aspect of someone's character that is presented to or perceived by others.*
- *An actor's portrayal of someone in a play.*
- *A role or character adopted by an author, actor, etc. or in a game.*
- *A personal facade that one presents to the world.*
- *(in Jungian psychology) the outer or assumed aspect of character.*
- *(Jungian psychology) a personal facade that one presents to the world.*



Synonyms of "Persona" as a noun (15 Words)

character	A person seen in terms of a particular aspect of character. <i>Shady characters.</i>
<u>exterior</u>	(in filming) an outdoor scene. <i>The museum has a modern exterior.</i>
<u>facade</u>	A showy misrepresentation intended to conceal something unpleasant. <i>Her flawless public facade masked private despair.</i>
face	A vertical surface of a building or cliff. <i>We can often see the dark face of the moon by earthshine.</i>
<u>front</u>	The part of a garment covering a person's front. <i>She put on a brave front.</i>
<u>guise</u>	An external form, appearance, or manner of presentation, typically concealing the true nature of something. <i>Under the guise of friendship he betrayed them.</i>

identity	Exact sameness. <i>She guessed the identity of his lover.</i>
image	A person or thing that closely resembles another. <i>Although her popular image was contrived it served to inspire music and pageantry.</i>
mask	A party of guests wearing costumes and masks. <i>His face was a mask of rage.</i>
part	A melody or other constituent of harmony assigned to a particular voice or instrument in a musical work. <i>They resisted every effort on his part.</i>
personality	The complex of all the attributes-behavioral, temperamental, emotional and mental-that characterize a unique individual. <i>She had a sunny personality that was very engaging.</i>
public face	A body of people sharing some common interest.
role	An actor's portrayal of someone in a play. <i>Play its role.</i>
self	Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else. <i>To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of self.</i>
theatrical role	A performance of a play.



Usage Examples of "Persona" as a noun

- *Chris adds that his media persona does not match reality.*
- *Persona and anima switch roles and merge in slow, smooth ways.*
- *His screen persona occasionally grates.*
- *Bowie burned through one persona after another.*
- *The real-world figure didn't quite match up to his muscle-bound, weapon-clad online persona.*
- *Her public persona has been sold to millions of women as the ideal.*



Associations of "Persona" (30 Words)

acting

The performance of a part or role in a drama.
*She studied **acting** in New York.*

actor

A person whose profession is acting on the stage, in films, or on television.
*In war one must be a good **actor**.*

aerial

Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air- Thomas Carlyle.
***Aerial** bombardment of civilian targets.*

assumed

Adopted in order to deceive.
*A man living under an **assumed** name.*

character

A characteristic especially one that assists in the identification of a species.
*The island is full of **character**.*

<u>concoct</u>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>Concoct a strange mixture.</i>
drama	A dramatic work intended for performance by actors on a stage. <i>An afternoon of high drama at Wembley.</i>
fancied	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A fancied wrong.</i>
<u>fictitious</u>	Occurring in or invented for fiction. <i>A fictitious address.</i>
figment	A contrived or fantastic idea. <i>A figment of the imagination.</i>
film	Make a film or photograph of something. <i>She glowered at the television crew who were filming them.</i>
histrionic	Denoting a personality disorder marked by shallow volatile emotions and attention-seeking behaviour. <i>He loved the theatre and everything which savoured of histrionics.</i>
<u>imaginary</u>	(of a number or quantity) expressed in terms of the square root of a negative number (usually the square root of -1, represented by i or j). <i>A small child s imaginary friends.</i>
imitative	Marked by or given to imitation. <i>I found the film pretentious and imitative.</i>
individuate	Give individual shape or form to. <i>Language that individuates his memories.</i>
performer	An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience. <i>A circus performer.</i>
pretended	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with pretended unconcern.</i>
<u>protagonist</u>	A person who backs a politician or a team etc. <i>The hard boiled protagonist of the movie Blade Runner.</i>
role	The actions and activities assigned to or required or expected of a person or group. <i>What is your role on the team.</i>
serial	Pertaining to or composed in serial technique. <i>A new three part drama serial.</i>
<u>sham</u>	Pretend to be or to be experiencing. <i>George abhorred sham and affectation.</i>
<u>streak</u>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>She could see white streaks in his beard.</i>

television	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen. <i>The days before television.</i>
tendency	A group within a larger political party or movement. <i>Fabric with a tendency to shrink.</i>
theatrical	Relating to acting, actors, or the theatre. <i>A boarding house that catered for theatricals.</i>
traitorous	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>A lying traitorous insurrectionist.</i>
tv	An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen. <i>The British call a tv set a telly.</i>
type	Write by means of a keyboard with types. <i>The kidney was typed.</i>
unsubstantial	Lacking material form or substance; unreal. <i>A pretty if unsubstantial cubist composition.</i>
video	Computer science the appearance of text and graphics on a video display. <i>They sat down to watch a video.</i>
