<b>abuse</b>	Assault (someone, especially a woman or child) sexually. <i>The referee was <b>abused</b> by players from both teams.</i>
<b>bend</b>	Bend a joint. <i>The road <b>bends</b>.</i>
<b>contaminate</b>	Make (something) impure by exposure to or addition of a poisonous or polluting substance. <i>Celebrity has <b>contaminated</b> every aspect of public life.</i>

<b>deflect</b>	Impede the movement of (an opponent or a ball). <i>The bullet was <b>deflected</b> harmlessly into the ceiling.</i>
<b>demoralise</b>	Lower someone's spirits; make downhearted.
<b>demoralize</b>	Lower someone's spirits; make downhearted. <i>The General Strike had <b>demoralized</b> the trade unions.</i>
<b>deprave</b>	Make (someone) immoral or wicked. <i>This book would <b>deprave</b> and corrupt young children.</i>
<b>distort</b>	Become twisted out of shape. <i>The pipe will <b>distort</b> as you bend it.</i>
<b>divert</b>	Send on a course or in a direction different from the planned or intended one. <i>Although the audience members were <b>diverted</b> by this new symphony critics disliked it.</i>
<b>falsify</b>	Insert words into texts often falsifying it thereby. <i><b>Falsify</b> the data.</i>
<b>garble</b>	Make false by mutilation or addition; as of a message or story. <i>The connection was awful and kept garbling his voice.</i>
<b>lead astray</b>	Be in charge of.
<b>make degenerate</b>	Consider as being.
<b>misapply</b>	Apply to a wrong thing or person; apply badly or incorrectly. <i>You are <b>misapplying</b> the name of this religious group.</i>
<b>misconstrue</b>	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>My advice was deliberately <b>misconstrued</b>.</i>
<b>misdirect</b>	Use or apply (something) wrongly or inappropriately. <i>He <b>misdirected</b> a shot.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>I think you re <b>misinterpreting</b> the situation.</i>
<b>misrepresent</b>	Give a false or misleading account of the nature of. <i>You are <b>misrepresenting</b> the views of the government.</i>

<b><u>misuse</u></b>	Change the inherent purpose or function of something. <i>The director of the factory <b>misused</b> the funds intended for the health care of his workers.</i>
<b>poison</b>	Adulterate or contaminate with poison. <i>Hunters would use the sap of monkshood to <b>poison</b> their spears.</i>
<b>pollute</b>	Contaminate (water, the air, etc.) with harmful or poisonous substances. <i>The industrial wastes <b>polluted</b> the lake.</i>
<b><u>profane</u></b>	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i><b>Profane</b> the name of God.</i>
<b>sophisticate</b>	Make someone or something more sophisticated. <i>Books of casuistry which <b>sophisticate</b> the understanding and defile the heart.</i>
<b><u>subvert</u></b>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>We must not let our civil liberties be <b>subverted</b> by the current crisis.</i>
<b><u>twist</u></b>	Twist or pull violently or suddenly especially so as to remove something from that to which it is attached or from where it originates. <i>Don't <b>twist</b> my words.</i>
<b>twist around</b>	Twist suddenly so as to sprain.
<b>vitiate</b>	Spoil or impair the quality or efficiency of. <i>Development programmes have been <b>vitiated</b> by the rise in population.</i>
<b>warp</b>	In weaving arrange yarn so as to form the warp of a piece of cloth. <i>Moisture had <b>warped</b> the box.</i>

<b>digress</b>	Lose clarity or turn aside especially from the main subject of attention or course of argument in writing, thinking, or speaking. <i>She always <b>digresses</b> when telling a story.</i>
<b>distort</b>	Become twisted out of shape. <i>Many factors can <b>distort</b> the results.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>They tried to stop the <b>escape</b> of gas from the damaged pipe.</i>
<b>garble</b>	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical <b>garble</b>.</i>
<b>kink</b>	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>Though the system is making some headway there are still some <b>kinks</b> to iron out.</i>
<b>lascivious</b>	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>He gave her a <b>lascivious</b> wink.</i>
<b>misdirect</b>	Lead someone in the wrong direction or give someone wrong directions. <i>Their efforts have been largely <b>misdirected</b>.</i>
<b>misguide</b>	Give bad advice to. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<b>mislead</b>	Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i>

<b><u>misuse</u></b>	The wrong or improper use of something. <i>A <b>misuse</b> of power.</i>
<b>perverse</b>	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>Kate s <b>perverse</b> decision not to cooperate held good.</i>
<b>reprobate</b>	(in Calvinism) a sinner who is not of the elect and is predestined to damnation. <i>God <b>reprobated</b> the unrepenting sinner.</i>
<b><u>slew</u></b>	Of an electronic device undergo slewing. <i>A <b>slew</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>swerve</b>	An abrupt change of direction. <i>O Hara <b>swerved</b> the motorcycle round the corner.</i>
<b><u>twist</u></b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>It was soon time for the next <b>twist</b> of fate in his extraordinary career.</i>
<b><u>veer</u></b>	Shift to a clockwise direction. <i>The motorbike <b>veered</b> to the right.</i>
<b>wrench</b>	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>You will need a <b>wrench</b> to tighten it in position.</i>
