- *(used of sexual behavior) showing or appealing to bizarre or deviant tastes.*
- *(of a person or their actions) characterized by sexually abnormal and unacceptable practices or tendencies.*
- *Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good.*

### Synonyms of "Perverted" as an adjective (27 Words)

Departing from an accepted standard.

This somewhat **aberrant** behaviour requires an explanation.

<b>abnormal</b>	<p>Deviating from what is normal or usual, typically in a way that is undesirable or worrying.</p> <p><i>The illness is recognizable from the patient's <b>abnormal</b> behaviour.</i></p>
<b>amoral</b>	<p>Lacking a moral sense; unconcerned with the rightness or wrongness of something.</p> <p><i>An <b>amoral</b> attitude to sex.</i></p>
<b>bad</b>	<p>Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad.</p> <p><i>Soap was <b>bad</b> for his face.</i></p>
<b>corrupt</b>	<p>Having or showing a willingness to act dishonestly in return for money or personal gain.</p> <p><i>A <b>corrupt</b> and rotting corpse.</i></p>
<b>corrupted</b>	<p>Not straight; dishonest or immoral or evasive.</p> <p><i>Spoke a <b>corrupted</b> version of the language.</i></p>
<b>debased</b>	<p>Ruined in character or quality.</p> <p><i>A <b>debased</b> currency.</i></p>
<b>debauched</b>	<p>Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs.</p> <p><i>A <b>debauched</b> lifestyle.</i></p>
<b>degenerate</b>	<p>Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline.</p> <p><i><b>Degenerate</b> offshoots from the main line of vertebrate progress.</i></p>
<b>depraved</b>	<p>Morally corrupt; wicked.</p> <p><i>He was a <b>depraved</b> lecher.</i></p>
<b>deviant</b>	<p>Homosexual (typically used of a man).</p> <p><i>A <b>deviant</b> ideology.</i></p>
<b><u>distorted</u></b>	<p>So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.</p> <p><i><b>Distorted</b> guitars.</i></p>
<b>evil</b>	<p>Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil.</p> <p><i>An <b>evil</b> influence.</i></p>
<b>immoral</b>	<p>Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong.</p> <p><i>Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.</i></p>
<b>misrepresented</b>	<p>Having an intended meaning altered or misrepresented.</p>
<b>perverse</b>	<p>Resistant to guidance or discipline.</p> <p><i>An evil life dedicated to <b>perverse</b> pleasure.</i></p>
<b>reprobate</b>	<p>(in Calvinism) predestined to damnation.</p> <p><i>The <b>reprobate</b> conduct of a gambling aristocrat.</i></p>

<b><u>rotten</u></b>	Morally, socially, or politically corrupt. <i>He believed that the whole art business was <b>rotten</b>.</i>
<b>sadistic</b>	Deriving pleasure or sexual gratification from inflicting pain on another. <i>She took a <b>sadistic</b> pleasure in tormenting him.</i>
<b><u>twisted</u></b>	(of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped. <i>A man with a <b>twisted</b> mind.</i>
<b><u>unhealthy</u></b>	Not having or showing good health. <i><b>Unhealthy</b> ulcers.</i>
<b>unnatural</b>	Not in accordance with or determined by nature; contrary to nature. <i>The formal tone of the programmes caused them to sound stilted and <b>unnatural</b>.</i>
<b>vile</b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He has a <b>vile</b> temper.</i>
<b>warped</b>	Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture. <i>A <b>warped</b> sense of humour.</i>
<b>wicked</b>	Having committed unrighteous acts. <i>A <b>wicked</b> cough.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Not in accord with established usage or procedure. <i>The report in the paper is <b>wrong</b>.</i>

<b><u>aberrant</u></b>	Departing from an accepted standard. <i><b>Aberrant</b> chromosomes.</i>
<b>debauch</b>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i><b>Debauch</b> the young people with wine and women.</i>
<b>degenerate</b>	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Get out of my house you <b>degenerate</b>.</i>

<b>depraved</b>	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>He was a <b>depraved</b> lecher.</i>
<b>depravity</b>	Moral corruption; wickedness. <i>Its brothels its opium parlors its <b>depravity</b>.</i>
<b>derail</b>	Cause (a train or tram) to leave its tracks accidentally. <i>The train <b>derailed</b> because a cow was standing on the tracks.</i>
<b>deteriorate</b>	Become worse or disintegrate. <i>Relations between the countries had <b>deteriorated</b> sharply.</i>
<b>deviant</b>	A deviant person or thing. <i><b>Deviant</b> ideas.</i>
<b>deviate</b>	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>The river was <b>deviated</b> to prevent flooding.</i>
<b>devolve</b>	Pass on or delegate to another. <i>The representative <b>devolved</b> his duties to his aides while he was in the hospital.</i>
<b>digress</b>	Wander from a direct or straight course. <i>She always <b>digresses</b> when telling a story.</i>
<b>distort</b>	Become twisted out of shape. <i>Many factors can <b>distort</b> the results.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>It is not a native of Britain though often occurring as an <b>escape</b>.</i>
<b>garble</b>	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical <b>garble</b>.</i>
<b>kink</b>	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>There are still a few <b>kinks</b> to iron out.</i>
<b>lascivious</b>	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>He gave her a <b>lascivious</b> wink.</i>
<b>misdirect</b>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Their efforts have been largely <b>misdirected</b>.</i>
<b>misguide</b>	Mislead. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>
<b>mislead</b>	Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i>
<b>misuse</b>	Apply to a wrong thing or person; apply badly or incorrectly. <i>A <b>misuse</b> of power.</i>

<b>perverse</b>	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>In two general elections the outcome was quite <b>perverse</b>.</i>
<b>reprobate</b>	(in Calvinism) predestined to damnation. <i><b>Reprobate</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>slew</b>	Of an electronic device undergo slewing. <i>The Renault <b>slewed</b> from side to side in the snow.</i>
<b>swerve</b>	An abrupt change of direction. <i>A lorry <b>swerved</b> across her path.</i>
<b>twist</b>	The extent of twisting of a rod or other object. <i>The wrestler <b>twisted</b> his shoulder.</i>
<b>veer</b>	Shift to a clockwise direction. <i>The conversation eventually <b>veered</b> away from theatrical things.</i>
<b>wrench</b>	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>The <b>wrench</b> to his knee occurred as he fell.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>I have done you a great <b>wrong</b>.</i>
