abnormal	<p>Deviating from what is normal or usual, typically in a way that is undesirable or worrying.</p> <p><i>The illness is recognizable from the patient's abnormal behaviour.</i></p>
amoral	<p>Lacking a moral sense; unconcerned with the rightness or wrongness of something.</p> <p><i>An amoral attitude to sex.</i></p>
bad	<p>Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad.</p> <p><i>Soap was bad for his face.</i></p>
corrupt	<p>Having or showing a willingness to act dishonestly in return for money or personal gain.</p> <p><i>A corrupt and rotting corpse.</i></p>
corrupted	<p>Not straight; dishonest or immoral or evasive.</p> <p><i>Spoke a corrupted version of the language.</i></p>
debased	<p>Ruined in character or quality.</p> <p><i>A debased currency.</i></p>
debauched	<p>Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs.</p> <p><i>A debauched lifestyle.</i></p>
degenerate	<p>Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline.</p> <p><i>Degenerate offshoots from the main line of vertebrate progress.</i></p>
depraved	<p>Morally corrupt; wicked.</p> <p><i>He was a depraved lecher.</i></p>
deviant	<p>Homosexual (typically used of a man).</p> <p><i>A deviant ideology.</i></p>
<u>distorted</u>	<p>So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.</p> <p><i>Distorted guitars.</i></p>
evil	<p>Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil.</p> <p><i>An evil influence.</i></p>
immoral	<p>Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong.</p> <p><i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i></p>
misrepresented	<p>Having an intended meaning altered or misrepresented.</p>
perverse	<p>Resistant to guidance or discipline.</p> <p><i>An evil life dedicated to perverse pleasure.</i></p>
reprobate	<p>(in Calvinism) predestined to damnation.</p> <p><i>The reprobate conduct of a gambling aristocrat.</i></p>

<u>rotten</u>	Morally, socially, or politically corrupt. <i>He believed that the whole art business was rotten.</i>
sadistic	Deriving pleasure or sexual gratification from inflicting pain on another. <i>She took a sadistic pleasure in tormenting him.</i>
<u>twisted</u>	(of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped. <i>A man with a twisted mind.</i>
<u>unhealthy</u>	Not having or showing good health. <i>Unhealthy ulcers.</i>
unnatural	Not in accordance with or determined by nature; contrary to nature. <i>The formal tone of the programmes caused them to sound stilted and unnatural.</i>
vile	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He has a vile temper.</i>
warped	Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture. <i>A warped sense of humour.</i>
wicked	Having committed unrighteous acts. <i>A wicked cough.</i>
wrong	Not in accord with established usage or procedure. <i>The report in the paper is wrong.</i>

debauch	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Debauch the young people with wine and women.</i>
degenerate	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Get out of my house you degenerate.</i>

depraved	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>He was a depraved lecher.</i>
depravity	Moral corruption; wickedness. <i>Its brothels its opium parlors its depravity.</i>
derail	Cause (a train or tram) to leave its tracks accidentally. <i>The train derailed because a cow was standing on the tracks.</i>
deteriorate	Become worse or disintegrate. <i>Relations between the countries had deteriorated sharply.</i>
deviant	A deviant person or thing. <i>Deviant ideas.</i>
deviate	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>The river was deviated to prevent flooding.</i>
devolve	Pass on or delegate to another. <i>The representative devolved his duties to his aides while he was in the hospital.</i>
digress	Wander from a direct or straight course. <i>She always digresses when telling a story.</i>
distort	Become twisted out of shape. <i>Many factors can distort the results.</i>
escape	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>It is not a native of Britain though often occurring as an escape.</i>
garble	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical garble.</i>
kink	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>There are still a few kinks to iron out.</i>
lascivious	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>He gave her a lascivious wink.</i>
misdirect	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Their efforts have been largely misdirected.</i>
misguide	Mislead. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and misguide the general reader.</i>
mislead	Give false or misleading information to. <i>The government misled the public about the road's environmental impact.</i>
misuse	Apply to a wrong thing or person; apply badly or incorrectly. <i>A misuse of power.</i>

perverse	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>In two general elections the outcome was quite perverse.</i>
reprobate	(in Calvinism) predestined to damnation. <i>Reprobate behaviour.</i>
slew	Of an electronic device undergo slewing. <i>The Renault slewed from side to side in the snow.</i>
swerve	An abrupt change of direction. <i>A lorry swerved across her path.</i>
twist	The extent of twisting of a rod or other object. <i>The wrestler twisted his shoulder.</i>
veer	Shift to a clockwise direction. <i>The conversation eventually veered away from theatrical things.</i>
wrench	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>The wrench to his knee occurred as he fell.</i>
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>I have done you a great wrong.</i>
