Definitions of "Pest" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "pest" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A destructive insect or other animal that attacks crops, food, livestock, etc.
- A persistently annoying person.
- A serious (sometimes fatal) infection of rodents caused by Yersinia pestis and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected animal.
- An annoying person or thing; a nuisance.
- Bubonic plague.
- Any epidemic disease with a high death rate.
- Any unwanted and destructive insect or other animal that attacks food or crops or livestock etc.

pesterer A persistently annoying person.

A small insect typically having a sting and living in a complex social colony ant

with one or more breeding queens. It is wingless except for fertile adults,

which form large mating swarms, and is proverbial for its industriousness.

aphid Any of various small plant-sucking insects.

arachnid Relating to or denoting arachnids.

An insect of a large group to which the honeybee belongs including many

solitary as well as social kinds.

A sewing **bee**.

Conceal a miniature microphone in (a room or device) in order to listen to

or record someone's conversations secretly.

They caught the sailing **bug**.

Flutter like a butterfly.

caterpillar A vehicle with caterpillar tracks.

flea Any wingless bloodsucking parasitic insect noted for ability to leap.

gadflyA fly that bites livestock, especially a horsefly, warble fly, or botfly.

grasshopper A plant-eating insect with long hind legs which are used for jumping and for

producing a chirping sound, frequenting grassy places and low vegetation.

hornet Large stinging paper wasp.

A common small fly occurring worldwide in and around human habitation.

housefly Its eggs are laid in decaying material, and the fly can be a health hazard

due to its contamination of food.

A small arthropod animal that has six legs and generally one or two pairs of

insect wings.

Insect pests.

insectivorous (of a plant such as the sundew) able to capture and digest insects.

louse A person who has a nasty or unethical character undeserving of respect.

Any of numerous very small to minute arachnids often infesting animals or

plants or stored foods.

mosquito

Two-winged insect whose female has a long proboscis to pierce the skin and

moth A clothes moth.

A contagious bacterial disease characterized by fever and delirium typically

Used in names of arachnids and insects resembling a scorpion e q false scorpion

scorpion water scorpion.

Move in a scuttling manner suggestive of a spider. **spider** A treecreeper **spider**ed head first down the tree trunk.

A large black wolf spider of southern Europe, whose bite was formerly tarantula

believed to cause tarantism.

A small, pale soft-bodied insect that lives in large colonies with several termite

different castes, typically within a mound of cemented earth. Many kinds

feed on wood and can be highly destructive to trees and timber.

Used in names of other animals that resemble worms in some way e g slow

worm shipworm.

worm **Worm**s take advantage of automatic file sending and receiving features

found on many computers.
