- Trouble or annoy (someone) with frequent or persistent requests or interruptions.





Synonyms of "Pester" as a verb (14 Words)

<u>annoy</u>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. Your damned cheerfulness has always annoy ed me.
badger	Repeatedly ask (someone) to do something; pester. Journalists badger ed him about the deals.
beleaguer	Annoy persistently. <i>Our leaders decided to beleaguer the city.</i>
bother	Take the trouble to do something; concern oneself. <i>The driver didn t</i> bother <i>to ask why.</i>
bug	Tap a telephone or telegraph wire to get information. Is this hotel room bug ged.
chivvy	Annoy continually or chronically. An association which chivvies government into action.
<u>harass</u>	Make repeated small-scale attacks on (an enemy. This man harass es his female co workers.



hound	Harass, persecute, or pursue relentlessly. She was hound ed by the Italian press.	
irk	Irritate; annoy. It irk s her to think of the runaround she received.	
irritate	Excite to an abnormal condition, or chafe or inflame. <i>Irritate</i> the glands of a leaf.	
keep after Maintain for use and service.		
<u>plague</u>	Cause continual trouble or distress to. He has been plague d by ill health.	
tease	Tear into pieces. I used to tease her about being so house proud.	
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>He was not troubled by doubts.</i>	

Usage Examples of "Pester" as a verb

• She constantly pestered him with telephone calls.

Associations of "Pester" (30 Words)

<u>afflict</u>	Cause great unhappiness for; distress. Serious ills afflict the industry.
aggravate	Make (a problem, injury, or offence) worse or more serious. <i>Military action would only aggravate the situation</i> .
<u>annoy</u>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. Your damned cheerfulness has always annoy ed me.
annoying	The act of troubling or annoying someone. Unsolicited calls are annoying .
badger	A heavily built omnivorous nocturnal mammal of the weasel family, typically having a grey and black coat. His daughter was always badger ing him to let her join.
beleaguer	Annoy persistently. <i>Our leaders decided to beleaguer the city.</i>
blooming	Informal intensifiers. I didn t learn a blooming thing.



bug	An insect of a large order distinguished by having mouthparts that are modified for piercing and sucking. <i>They caught the sailing bug</i> .
<u>disturb</u>	Destroy the peace or tranquility of. Don t disturb the patient s wounds by moving him too rapidly.
galling	Causing annoyance or resentment; annoying. Found it galling to have to ask permission.
<u>harass</u>	Annoy continually or chronically. <i>Harass</i> the enemy.
importunate	Persistent, especially to the point of annoyance. An importunate job applicant.
<u>insult</u>	A deliberately offensive act or something producing the effect of deliberate disrespect. <i>He hurled insults at us.</i>
irk	Irritate or vex. It irk s her to think of the runaround she received.
irritable	Abnormally sensitive to a stimulus. She was tired and irritable .
irritate	Make (someone) annoyed or a little angry. It irritate s me that she never closes the door after she leaves.
mocking	Making fun of someone or something in a cruel way; derisive. <i>Her</i> mocking <i>smile</i> .
nag	A person who nags someone. Something nag ged at the back of his mind.
nettle	Sting with or as with nettles and cause a stinging pain or sensation. I was only asking Jess said nettle d.
offend	Cause to feel resentment or indignation. Her tactless remark offend ed me.
peeve	Cause to be annoyed, irritated, or resentful. Another peeve of mine is these so called reality shows.
persiflage	Light teasing. An air of persiflage .
<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. Her behavior provoke d a quarrel between the couple.
rag	Play in ragtime. Not a rag of clothing has arrived to us this winter.



rankle	(of a comment or fact) cause continuing annoyance or resentment. Lisa was rankle d by his assertion.
rile	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. He has been rile d by suggestions that his Arsenal future is in doubt.
tease	Gently pull or comb (tangled wool, hair, etc.) into separate strands. I used to tease her about being so house proud.
<u>teasing</u>	Causing irritation or annoyance. Her lazy teasing smile.
vex	Angry; annoyed. Thou shalt not vex a stranger.
<u>vexation</u>	Something or someone that causes anxiety; a source of unhappiness. <i>The vexations of life under canvas.</i>
