<u>breathtaking</u>	Tending to cause suspension of regular breathing. <i>Breathtaking adventure.</i>
exceptional	Deviating widely from a norm of physical or mental ability; used especially of children below normal in intelligence. <i>An exceptional memory.</i>
extraordinary	(of an official) specially employed in addition to the usual staff. <i>An extraordinary session of the Congress.</i>

magnificent	Very good; excellent. <i>She paid tribute to their magnificent efforts.</i>
marvellous	Extremely good or pleasing; splendid. <i>You have done a marvellous job.</i>
<u>miraculous</u>	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention. <i>I felt amazed and grateful for our miraculous escape.</i>
outstanding	Owed as a debt. <i>An outstanding fact of our time is that nations poisoned by anti semitism proved less fortunate in regard to their own freedom.</i>
remarkable	Unusual or striking. <i>A remarkable coincidence.</i>
<u>sensational</u>	Causing intense interest, curiosity, or emotion. <i>A sensational murder trial.</i>
<u>singular</u>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>No explanation accompanied this rather singular statement.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>Suffered a staggering defeat.</i>
stunning	Commanding attention. <i>Laid the poor fellow senseless with one stunning blow.</i>
wonderful	Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers. <i>The climate was wonderful all the year round.</i>

magnificent	Very good; excellent. <i>Magnificent cathedrals.</i>

<u>miraculous</u>	Remarkable and bringing very welcome consequences. <i>I felt amazed and grateful for our miraculous escape.</i>
outstanding	Clearly noticeable. <i>Works of outstanding banality.</i>
preeminence	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
prodigious	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>The stove consumed a prodigious amount of fuel.</i>
profound	Profound quality. <i>Profound crevasses.</i>
regale	Entertain or amuse (someone) with talk. <i>He was regaled with excellent home cooking.</i>
remarkable	Worthy of attention; striking. <i>A remarkable sight.</i>
splendid	Excellent; very good. <i>His robes were splendid.</i>

<u>super</u>	A superintendent. <i>Another super skyscraper.</i>
superb	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e g superb lyrebird. <i>A superb performance.</i>
surpassing	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of surpassing beauty.</i>
terrific	Causing extreme terror. <i>Fought a terrific battle.</i>
<u>unparalleled</u>	Having no parallel or equal; exceptional. <i>Unparalleled athletic ability.</i>
vantage	Place or situation affording some advantage especially a comprehensive view or commanding perspective. <i>The past is continuously reinterpreted from the vantage point of the present.</i>
