- *A remarkable development.*
- *The object of a person's perception.*
- *A fact or situation that is observed to exist or happen, especially one whose cause or explanation is in question.*
- *Any state or process known through the senses rather than by intuition or reasoning.*



Synonyms of "Phenomenon" as a noun (22 Words)

- appearance** Formal attendance (in court or at a hearing) of a party in an action.
*They try to keep up **appearances**.*
- case** An agreed summary of the facts relating to a legal case drawn up for review or decision on a point of law by a higher court.
*That was not the **case**.*
- circumstance** The set of facts or circumstances that surround a situation or event.
*They were thrown together by **circumstance**.*
- curiosity** A strong desire to know or learn something.
***Curiosity** got the better of me so I called him.*
- episode** A happening that is distinctive in a series of related events.
*Acute psychotic **episodes**.*
- event** A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon.
*He acted very wise after the **event**.*
- experience** The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession.
*She spoke from **experience**.*

fact	Information used as evidence or as part of a report or news article. <i>A body of fact.</i>
happening	An event or occurrence. <i>Altogether it was an eerie happening.</i>
incident	A violent event, such as a fracas or assault. <i>One person was stabbed in the incident.</i>
marvel	A wonderful or astonishing person or thing. <i>The marvels of technology.</i>
miracle	Any amazing or wonderful occurrence. <i>Industries at the heart of the economic miracle.</i>
nonpareil	An old type size equal to six points (larger than ruby). <i>A great player Britain s nonpareil of the 1980s.</i>
occurrence	The fact or frequency of something happening. <i>The occurrence or presence of life on other planets.</i>
prodigy	An unusually gifted or intelligent (young) person; someone whose talents excite wonder and admiration. <i>Germany seemed a prodigy of industrial discipline.</i>
rarity	A rare thing, especially one having particular value. <i>The rarity of the condition.</i>
sensation	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>Anticipation produced in me a sensation somewhere between hope and fear.</i>
sight	The range of vision. <i>He was getting used to seeing unpleasant sights.</i>
situation	A condition or position in which you find yourself. <i>The dangerous situation developed suddenly.</i>
spectacle	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The acrobatic feats make a good spectacle.</i>
thing	Personal belongings or clothing. <i>Things haven t gone entirely to plan.</i>
wonder	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>A wonder drug.</i>

accidental	Incidental; subsidiary. <i>An accidental shooting.</i>
accidentally	By chance; inadvertently. <i>Accidentally knocked the vase over.</i>
activate	Make (something) active or operative. <i>Fumes from cooking are enough to activate the alarm.</i>
actually	At the present moment. <i>No one actually saw the shark.</i>
be	Be priced at. <i>It will be Christmas soon.</i>
casually	In an unconcerned manner. <i>I work casually as a staff nurse.</i>

<u>coincidence</u>	An event that might have been arranged although it was really accidental. <i>It was a coincidence that she was wearing a jersey like Laura s.</i>
<u>contemporaneous</u>	Existing at or occurring in the same period of time. <i>A rise in interest rates is often contemporaneous with an increase in inflation.</i>
<u>episode</u>	A section between two choric songs in Greek tragedy. <i>The whole episode has been a major embarrassment.</i>
event	Something that happens at a given place and time. <i>Staff have been holding a number of events to raise money for charity.</i>
exist	Have an existence be extant. <i>How am I going to exist without you.</i>
hap	An accidental happening. <i>What can hap to him worthy to be deemed evil.</i>
happen	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance Santayana. <i>The same thing happened to me.</i>
happening	Fashionable; trendy. <i>Altogether it was an eerie happening.</i>
happenstance	An event that might have been arranged although it was really accidental. <i>It was just happenstance that I happened to be there.</i>
<u>inadvertently</u>	Without knowledge or intention. <i>His name had been inadvertently omitted from the list.</i>
<u>incidence</u>	The relative frequency of occurrence of something. <i>The point of incidence of the beam.</i>
<u>incident</u>	(sometimes followed by `to') minor or casual or subordinate in significance or nature or occurring as a chance concomitant or consequence. <i>The road will bring other incidental advantages.</i>
incidental	An item that is incidental. <i>He requested reimbursement of 7 for incidental expenses.</i>
materialize	Represent or cause to appear in bodily or physical form. <i>The train failed to materialize.</i>
misstep	An unintentional but embarrassing blunder. <i>His campaign has been a farrago of missteps and mixed messages.</i>
occasion	Give occasion to. <i>An occasion arranged to honor the president.</i>

occur	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>Radon occurs naturally in rocks such as granite.</i>
<u>occurrence</u>	The fact of something existing or being found in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>The occurrence of natural gas fields.</i>
<u>output</u>	Production of a certain amount. <i>Output from the mine ceased in May.</i>
recur	Go back to (something) in thought or speech. <i>The book remained a favourite and she constantly recurred to it.</i>
<u>recurring</u>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
social	An informal social gathering especially one organized by the members of a particular club or group. <i>Guy led a full social life.</i>
status	High rank or social standing. <i>An update on the status of the bill.</i>
<u>unintentionally</u>	Without intention; in an unintentional manner. <i>Unintentionally rude song lyrics.</i>
