philosophizer	Someone who considers situations from a philosophical point of view.
theoretician	Someone who theorizes (especially in science or art).

theorizer	Someone who theorizes (especially in science or art).
thinker	An important intellectual. <i>A leading scientific thinker.</i>

anthropologist	An expert in or student of anthropology. <i>Some anthropologists think that members of hunting and gathering societies tend to have more leisure.</i>
<u>apathetic</u>	Marked by a lack of interest. <i>A woman who became active rather than apathetic as she grew older.</i>
deducible	Capable of being deduced.

<u>historian</u>	A person who is an authority on history and who studies it and writes about it. <i>A military historian.</i>
inductive	Possessing inductance. <i>Inductive to the sin of Eve.</i>
logic	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>By the logic of war.</i>
<u>logical</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>A logical mind.</i>
logician	A person skilled at symbolic logic. <i>A leading mathematical logician.</i>
mathematician	An expert in or student of mathematics. <i>One of the world's foremost theoretical mathematicians.</i>
philosophical	Relating or devoted to the study of the fundamental nature of knowledge, reality, and existence. <i>He was philosophical about losing the contract.</i>
philosophy	A particular system of philosophical thought. <i>Self-indulgence was his only philosophy.</i>
positivism	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.

pragmatist	An advocate of the approach that evaluates theories or beliefs in terms of the success of their practical application. <i>American pragmatists have influenced a great deal of recent philosophy of many types.</i>
<u>quibble</u>	Evade the truth of a point or question by raising irrelevant objections. <i>The only quibble about this book is the price.</i>
<u>scholar</u>	A university student holding a scholarship. <i>Mr Bell declares himself no scholar.</i>
sinologist	A student of Chinese history and language and culture.
sociologist	An expert in or student of the development, structure, and functioning of human society. <i>Historians and sociologists are still split on the matter.</i>
sophism	A deliberately invalid argument displaying ingenuity in reasoning in the hope of deceiving someone.
sophist	Any of a group of Greek philosophers and teachers in the 5th century BC who speculated on a wide range of subjects.
sophistry	A deliberately invalid argument displaying ingenuity in reasoning in the hope of deceiving someone. <i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure sophistry.</i>
<u>stoic</u>	A person who can endure pain or hardship without showing their feelings or complaining. <i>A stoical sufferer.</i>
study	Be a student follow a course of study be enrolled at an institute of learning. <i>She is in a deep study.</i>
syllogism	Deductive reasoning as distinct from induction. <i>This school of epistemology is highly advanced in syllogism and logical reasoning.</i>
syllogistic	Of or relating to or consisting of syllogism.
theologian	A person who engages or is an expert in theology.
transcendentalism	Any system of philosophy emphasizing the intuitive and spiritual above the empirical and material.
