- An individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language.
- Electro-acoustic transducer for converting electric signals into sounds; it is held over or inserted into the ear.
- (phonetics) an individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language.
- Headphones or earphones.
- A telephone.
- Electronic equipment that converts sound into electrical signals that can be



transmitted over distances and then converts received signals back into sounds.


