<b>habitus</b>	A person's general constitution, especially physical build. <i>Depending on their position in a given social field they develop a certain <b>habitus</b> typical of their position.</i>
<b>human body</b>	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
<b>make-up</b>	Cosmetics applied to the face to improve or change your appearance.
<b>material body</b>	The tangible substance that goes into the makeup of a physical object.
<b>muscles</b>	Possessing muscular strength. <i>The drug lord had his muscleman to protect him.</i>
<b>musculature</b>	The system or arrangement of muscles in a body, part of the body, or an organ. <i>The shape and <b>musculature</b> of a dolphin.</i>
<b>proportions</b>	Magnitude or extent. <i>A building of vast <b>proportions</b>.</i>

<b>crone</b>	An ugly evil-looking old woman.
<b>debilitated</b>	In a very weakened and infirm state. <i>A <b>debilitated</b> patient.</i>
<b><u>decrepit</u></b>	(of a person) elderly and infirm. <i>A <b>decrepit</b> bus its seats held together with friction tape.</i>
<b><u>decrepitude</u></b>	A state of deterioration due to old age or long use. <i>He had passed directly from middle age into <b>decrepitude</b>.</i>
<b>dotage</b>	The period of life in which a person is old and weak. <i>You could live here and look after me in my <b>dotage</b>.</i>
<b>elderly</b>	(of a person) old or ageing. <i>Specialist services for the <b>elderly</b>.</i>
<b><u>emaciated</u></b>	Abnormally thin or weak, especially because of illness or a lack of food. <i>She was so <b>emaciated</b> she could hardly stand.</i>
<b>emaciation</b>	Extreme leanness (usually caused by starvation or disease). <i>Thin to the point of <b>emaciation</b>.</i>
<b><u>fragile</u></b>	(of an object) easily broken or damaged. <i><b>Fragile</b> porcelain plates.</i>
<b><u>frail</u></b>	The weight of a frail basket full of raisins or figs between 50 and 75 pounds. <i>An invalid s <b>frail</b> body.</i>
<b>frailty</b>	Weakness in character or morals. <i>The increasing <b>frailty</b> of old age.</i>
<b><u>gaunt</u></b>	(of a building or place) grim or desolate in appearance. <i>A nightmare population of <b>gaunt</b> men and skeletal boys.</i>
<b>haggard</b>	A haggard hawk. <i>Alex s <b>haggard</b> face.</i>
<b>health</b>	A healthy state of wellbeing free from disease. <i>His delicate <b>health</b>.</i>
<b>infirm</b>	(of a person or their judgement) weak; irresolute. <i>Those who were old or <b>infirm</b>.</i>
<b><u>muscular</u></b>	Having a robust muscular body build characterized by predominance of structures bone and muscle and connective tissue developed from the embryonic mesodermal layer. <i>Energy is needed for <b>muscular</b> activity.</i>
<b>physical</b>	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>The <b>physical</b> size of a computer.</i>
<b>physically</b>	In accord with physical laws. <i>It is <b>physically</b> impossible to check every car.</i>

<b>rickety</b>	Lacking bodily or muscular strength or vitality. <i>Poverty was evident in undernourished faces or <b>rickety</b> legs.</i>
<b>senescence</b>	The organic process of growing older and showing the effects of increasing age.
<u><b>senile</b></u>	Mentally or physically infirm with age. <i>She couldn't cope with her <b>senile</b> husband.</i>
<b>strength</b>	The potency or degree of concentration of a drug, chemical, or drink. <i>Fatigue sapped his <b>strength</b>.</i>
<b>tendinous</b>	Consisting of tendons or resembling a tendon. <i>A band of muscular and <b>tendinous</b> fibres.</i>
<u><b>vulnerable</b></u>	Exposed to the possibility of being attacked or harmed, either physically or emotionally. <i>An argument <b>vulnerable</b> to refutation.</i>
<u><b>weak</b></u>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A <b>weak</b> magnetic field.</i>
<b>weakly</b>	In a weak or feeble manner or to a minor degree. <i>She leaned <b>weakly</b> against the wall.</i>
<u><b>weakness</b></u>	A penchant for something even though it might not be good for you. <i>The <b>weakness</b> of the dollar against the yen.</i>
