Showing a deliberate and obstinate desire to behave in a way that is

unreasonable or unacceptable. perverse

A perverse mood.

Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. recalcitrant

A class of **recalcitrant** fifteen year olds.

(of a person, illness, or diseased tissue) not yielding to treatment. refractory

**Refractory** materials found in lunar samples.

Causing one to feel bored or annoyed. tiresome

Weeding is a **tiresome** but essential job.

Causing difficulty or annoyance. troublesome

A troublesome infection.

Difficult or annoying; hard to endure. trying

It had been a very **trying** day.

unmanageable Incapable of being controlled or managed. An unmanageable situation.

fussy Annoyed and irritable.

The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner.

In his **haste** to leave he forgot his book.

Marked by precise accordance with details.

meticulous

A meticulous craftsman.

Seized and controlled as by military invasion.

Only the ground floor is fully **occupied**.

painstakingly It is almost a waste of time painstakingly to learn the routines of selling.
