<u><b>crusade</b></u>	Each of a series of medieval military expeditions made by Europeans to recover the Holy Land from the Muslims in the 11th, 12th, and 13th centuries. <i>A <b>crusade</b> against crime.</i>
<u><b>excursion</b></u>	Wandering from the main path of a journey. <i>A gantry controlled the radial and tangential <b>excursion</b> of each detector.</i>
<b>holy expedition</b>	A sacred place of pilgrimage.
<b>journey</b>	A long and often difficult process of personal change and development. <i>An eight hour train <b>journey</b>.</i>
<u><b>mission</b></u>	A building or group of buildings used by a Christian mission. <i>Gandhi s attitude to <b>mission</b> and conversion.</i>
<b>pilgrim's journey</b>	The act of traveling from one place to another.
<b>religious journey</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b>trip</b>	A self-indulgent attitude or activity. <i>He took a <b>trip</b> to the shopping center.</i>

<b><u>angelic</u></b>	Of or relating to angels. <i>The <b>angelic</b> hosts.</i>
<b>beatific</b>	Feeling or expressing blissful happiness. <i>A <b>beatific</b> smile.</i>
<b>bible</b>	The sacred writings of the Christian religions.
<b>blessed</b>	Roman Catholic proclaimed one of the blessed and thus worthy of veneration. <i>A <b>blessed</b> time.</i>
<b>buddhist</b>	One who follows the teachings of Buddha.
<b><u>church</u></b>	Take a woman who has recently given birth to church for a service of thanksgiving. <i>After <b>church</b> we went to a restaurant.</i>
<b>consecrate</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high or sacred purpose. <i>The present Holy Trinity church was <b>consecrated</b> in 1845.</i>



<b>dedicated</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>A chapel <b>dedicated</b> to the dead of World War II.</i>
<b>deist</b>	A person who believes that God created the universe and then abandoned it.
<b><u>devout</u></b>	Having or showing deep religious feeling or commitment. <i>A rabbi s <b>devout</b> prayers.</i>
<b><u>divine</u></b>	Resulting from divine providence. <i>The <b>divine</b> Shakespeare.</i>
<b>ecclesiastic</b>	Of or associated with a church (especially a Christian Church). <i><b>Ecclesiastic</b> history.</i>
<b>godly</b>	Emanating from God. <i>Leading a <b>godly</b> life.</i>
<b>hallowed</b>	Made holy; consecrated. <i><b>Hallowed</b> ground.</i>
<b>holy</b>	(of a person) devoted to the service of God. <i>Saints and <b>holy</b> men.</i>
<b>liturgy</b>	A religious service conducted according to a liturgy. <i>The Church of England <b>liturgy</b>.</i>
<b>persecution</b>	The act of persecuting (especially on the basis of race or religion). <i>Her family fled religious <b>persecution</b>.</i>
<b>pharisaic</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
<b>pilgrim</b>	Travel or wander like a pilgrim. <i>Thousands of <b>pilgrims</b> converged in Memphis for the 16th anniversary of Presley s death.</i>
<b><u>pious</u></b>	Having or showing or expressing reverence for a deity. <i>A deeply <b>pious</b> woman.</i>
<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i><b>Religious</b> in observing the rules of health.</i>
<b><u>reverent</u></b>	Showing great reverence for god. <i>A <b>reverent</b> silence.</i>
<b>sacrament</b>	(in the Christian Church) a religious ceremony or ritual regarded as imparting divine grace, such as baptism, the Eucharist and (in the Roman Catholic and many Orthodox Churches) penance and the anointing of the sick. <i>He heard Mass and received the <b>sacrament</b>.</i>
<b>sacred</b>	(of writing or text) embodying the laws or doctrines of a religion. <i><b>Sacred</b> texts.</i>

<b>sacrilege</b>	Violation or misuse of what is regarded as sacred. <i>Putting ecclesiastical vestments to secular use was considered <b>sacrilege</b>.</i>
<b>saint</b>	Used in titles of religious saints. <i>A place dedicated to a seventh century <b>saint</b>.</i>
<b>saintly</b>	Marked by utter benignity; resembling or befitting an angel or saint. <i>A truly <b>saintly</b> woman.</i>
<b>sanctity</b>	Ultimate importance and inviolability. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<b>scripture</b>	The sacred writings of the Christian religions. <i>Passages of <b>scripture</b>.</i>
<b>shrine</b>	Enshrine. <i>Her grave has become a <b>shrine</b> for fans from all over the world.</i>
