- *A tall vertical structure of stone, wood, or metal, used as a support for a building, or as an ornament or monument.*
- *(architecture) a tall vertical cylindrical structure standing upright and used to support a structure.*
- *Something shaped like a pillar.*
- *A tall vertical cylindrical structure standing upright and used to support a structure.*
- *A vertical cylindrical structure standing alone and not supporting anything (such as a monument).*

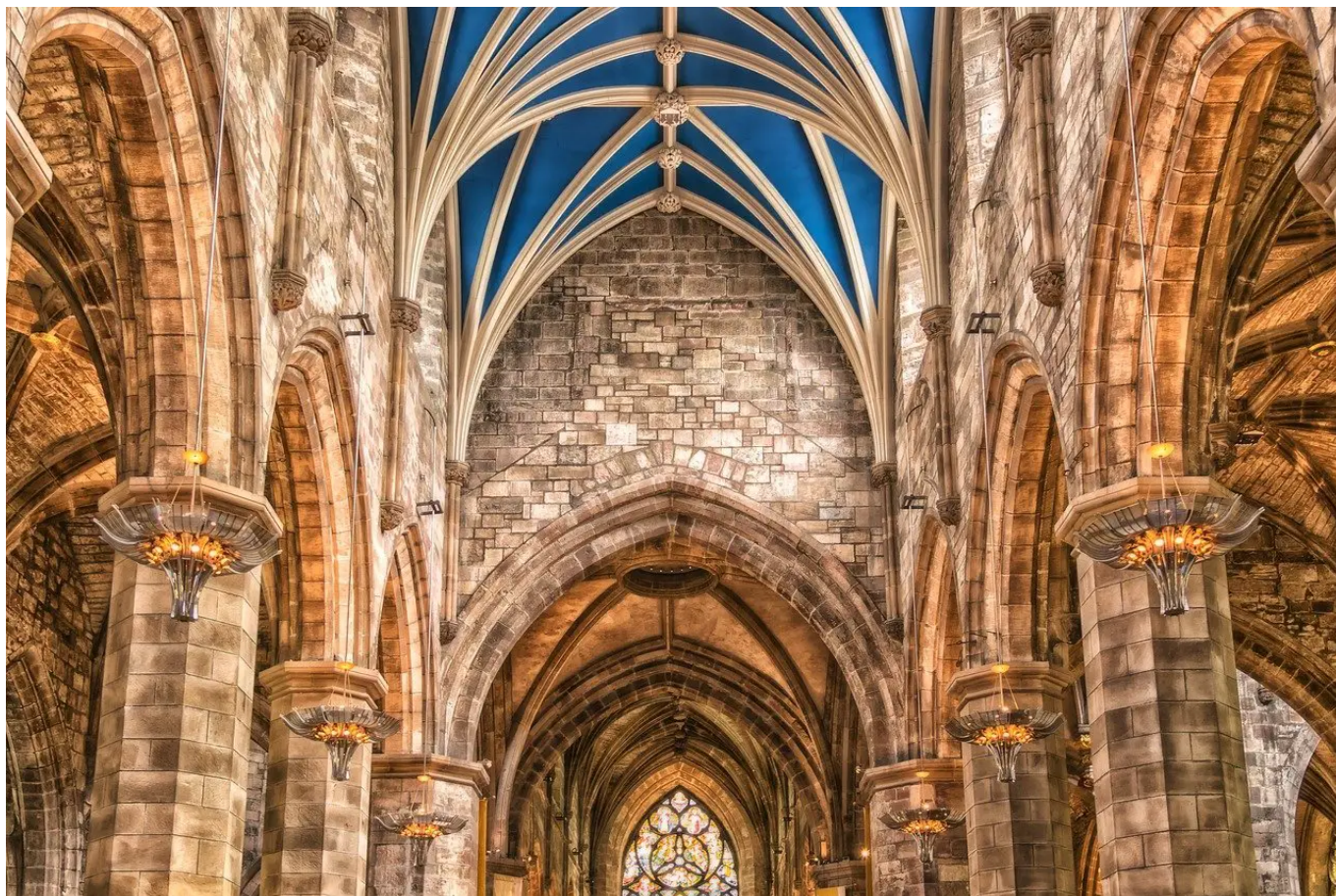
baluster	Of a furniture leg or other decorative item having the form of a baluster. <i>Baluster legs in English oak.</i>
<u>bastion</u>	A natural rock formation resembling a man made bastion. <i>The last bastion of communism.</i>
buttress	A structure of stone or brick built against a wall to strengthen or support it. <i>The political police were the main buttress of the regime.</i>
<u>column</u>	A vertical glass tube used in column chromatography a mixture is poured in the top and washed through a stationary substance where components of the mixture are adsorbed selectively to form colored bands. <i>A column of tanks moved north west.</i>
<u>mainstay</u>	A central cohesive source of support and stability. <i>Farming is the mainstay of the rural economy.</i>

pier	A vertical supporting structure (as a portion of wall between two doors or windows).
pilaster	A rectangular column, especially one projecting from a wall.
pile	A nuclear reactor. <i>He s making piles of money.</i>
piling	A nuclear reactor that uses controlled nuclear fission to generate energy. <i>Wooden piling supporting a complex of waterfront buildings.</i>
pole	A long slender flexible rod of wood or fibreglass used by a competitor in pole vaulting. <i>New poles should be protected from grazing livestock.</i>
post	The system whereby messages are transmitted via the post office. <i>She was opening her post.</i>
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>He found himself becoming the emotional prop of the marriage.</i>
rock	A large piece of rock which has become detached from a cliff or mountain a boulder. <i>The new system is heading for the rocks.</i>
stalwart	A person who is loyal to their allegiance (especially in times of revolt). <i>The stalwarts of the Labour Party.</i>
stanchion	Any vertical post or rod used as a support.
standard	The value behind the money in a monetary system. <i>Distance was marked by standards every mile.</i>
strength	Capacity to produce strong physiological or chemical effects. <i>An under strength side.</i>
support	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>He leaned against the wall for support.</i>
tower	Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower. <i>A CD tower.</i>
tower of strength	Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower.
upright	An upright piano. <i>A first class upright that would satisfy an amateur pianist.</i>
vertical	A vertical line or plane. <i>The resort claims a vertical of 2 100 metres.</i>

backbone	The main chain of a polymeric molecule. <i>The great Pennine range is the backbone of England.</i>
<u>basis</u>	The system or principles according to which an activity or process is carried on. <i>He worked on an interim basis.</i>
<u>behemoth</u>	Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful. <i>Behemoths like the brontosaurus.</i>
buttress	Reinforce with a buttress. <i>Buttress your thesis.</i>
carillon	A tune played on a carillon.
<u>column</u>	Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower. <i>Turn to page five column seven.</i>
corinthian	Of or relating to or characteristic of Corinth or its inhabitants.

forwarding	The advancement of some enterprise. <i>His experience in marketing resulted in the forwarding of his career.</i>
keystone	The central principle or part of a policy, system, etc., on which all else depends. <i>The keystone of campaign reform was the ban on soft money.</i>
leviathan	A very large aquatic creature, especially a whale. <i>The great leviathans of the deep.</i>
lighthouse	A tower or other structure containing a beacon light to warn or guide ships at sea.
marble	Paint or stain like marble. <i>Her shoulders were as white as marble.</i>
masonry	Freemasonry. <i>Hands roughened from carpentry and masonry.</i>
mast	A tall upright post on land, especially a flagpole or a television or radio transmitter.
obelisk	A mountain tree or other natural object resembling an obelisk in shape.
pagoda	An ornamental imitation of a Hindu or Buddhist pagoda.
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>Before every scene he ran down his checklist of props.</i>
pylon	A tower or post marking a path for light aircraft, cars, or other vehicles, especially in racing. <i>Power pylons are a favorite target for terrorists.</i>
sand	A light yellow brown colour like that of sand. <i>Mask off the area to be painted and sand it down.</i>
sarcophagus	A stone coffin (usually bearing sculpture or inscriptions).
sculpt	Shape (a material like stone or wood) by whittling away at it. <i>She is sculpting the block of marble into an image of her husband.</i>
sculpture	Form or shape as if by sculpture especially with strong smooth curves. <i>The choir stalls were each carefully sculptured.</i>
spire	A tapering conical or pyramidal structure on the top of a building, typically a church tower. <i>Spires of delphiniums.</i>
stalactite	A cylinder of calcium carbonate hanging from the roof of a limestone cave.
stone	Remove the stone from a fruit. <i>Her face was as hard as stone.</i>
structure	Give a structure to. <i>The station is a magnificent structure and should not be demolished.</i>

support A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts.

*He does not **support** his natural children.*

tower Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower.

*He seemed to **tower** over everyone else.*

trestle Sawhorses used in pairs to support a horizontal tabletop.

turret A rotating holder for tools, especially on a lathe.

*A castle with fairy tale **turrets**.*
