<b><u>aircraft</u></b>	A vehicle that can fly.
<b>airliner</b>	A large passenger aircraft.
<b>airman</b>	A pilot or member of the crew of an aircraft, especially in an air force.
<b><u>airplane</u></b>	A powered flying vehicle with fixed wings and a weight greater than that of the air it displaces; an aeroplane. <i>The flight was delayed due to trouble with the <b>airplane</b>.</i>
