| groundbreaker | Someone who helps to open up a new line of research or technology or art. |
| innovator | Someone who helps to open up a new line of research or technology or art. <i>He was one of the great innovators in jazz.</i> |
| instigator | A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>He was not the instigator of the incident.</i> |
| pathfinder | An aircraft sent ahead to locate and mark the target area for bombing. <i>A pathfinder prospectus.</i> |
| settler | A negotiator who settles disputes. <i>The early European settlers in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.</i> |
| trailblazer | A person who is the first to do something; an innovator. <i>He was a trailblazer for many ideas that are now standard fare.</i> |

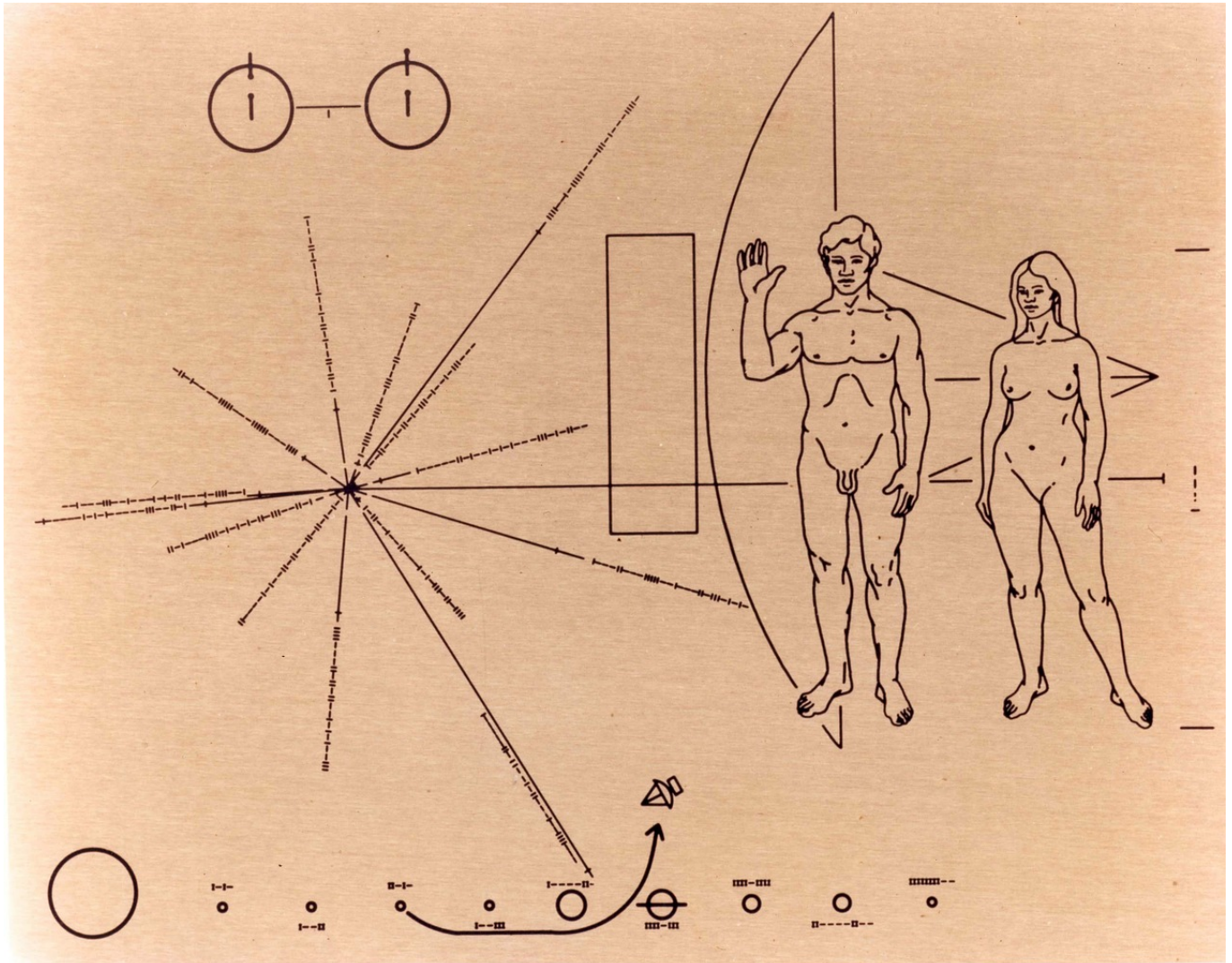
